Bread Cast on Water Is Returned Buttered, According to Monmouth Minister's Personal Experience

MONMOUTH—Rev. C. E. Hicks, minister of the Evangelical church here, is modestly admitting that bread cast on the water returned to him buttered this year.

He never turns down a hitch-hiker. Having adult children of his own he insists that young men, and young women, too, are often obliged to travel without the price of a ticket because of economic control.

He does his bit to help those who come his way. When he arrives in Monmouth with a guest from the road, he invariably invites the traveler to come to his home and dine with him. This doesn't mean a sandwich handed out. It means a regular meal cooked by Mrs. Hicks and served on the family table for the entire household.

This year, just before Christmas day, a young man in his early twenties appeared at the Hicks' door, asked how long they had lived here and on being told three years, stated:

"You are the people who gave me a ride and supper about two years ago. You picked me up between Eugene and Monmouth, brought me this far, and fed me at your home. I want you to know that I haven't forgotten what you did for me—a stranger."

Dashing out to his car—he was not on foot this time—he returned with a 14-pound dressed turkey which he presented to the astonished Mrs. Hicks. Rev. Hicks was not at home at the time.

The boy explained that he is now working on his aunt's turkey farm near Eugene and wanted to do something to show his appreciation of their kindness.

Rev. Hicks says he cannot recall the incident as an individual happening, because he picks up and feeds so many hikers that this particular one had passed from his remembrance. Mrs. Hicks vaguely recalled some items in the boy's story after seeing him. Anyhow, the Hicks' family enjoyed a fine turkey dinner plus the glow of Christmas spirit the stranger's gratitude gave them.
