Postponement Of Case Asked

Defense Would Move Up Trial of State vs. Adam Engel

Formal motion was filed yesterday by Guy O. Smith, defense attorney, in the case of state vs. Adam Engel, asking that the date of trial be postponed from next Monday to some time in February.

The motion states that the defense wishes to summon Frank Lightfoot as a witness, on the belief that he will testify that certain signatures are not forgeries as the state maintains.

It adds that Lightfoot will not be in Salem until February, and that the defense needs further time to prepare its case in other respects.

The motion will be argued before the court some time in the near future, and indications exist that the state may ask that the defendant, now at large on his own recognizance, be placed on bail if the trial is not to be held immediately.

Another ramifications of the postponement motion appeared yesterday when District Attorney Lyle J. Page stated that if the Engel case is not tried next Monday, the trial of the case of state vs. Roy S. Nelson be heard on that day.

Whether such a request would be granted by the court remains speculative, however, since Judge L. H. McMahon has previously stated that a witness of equal importance should the Nelson case come before him, and whether efforts have already been made to secure a new judge is not known.

Professor Scans Political Leaders

Willamette Instructor Is Speaker at Thursday Chapel Session

"America cannot afford the luxury of four more years of Roosevelt," Prof. William C. Jones told Willamette university students at chapel Thursday morning, in urging that they make politics their avocation for the coming 10 months. He said that the democratic party has been split wide open and another term would result in constant strife between the president and congress.

Prof. Jones, head of the departments of public and business administration at the university, reviewed other democratic aspirants. Ickes is but "an escaped republican," and "I hesitate to think what the republicans would do to a man with a name like McNutt." Garner, he said, is a symbol of opposition to the new deal and Jackson, new attorney-general, is an out-and-out new dealer. Hull he described as the most logical of all, because he has the confidence and respect of both factions of the party.

Four characteristics are essential in a presidential candidate, and according to Frank R. Kent no republican thus far put to the fore is a winner, because each lacks one or more.

McNutt, he said, is an unswerving party man. He must be available, in other words be from a state whose electoral votes are powerful, which in Jones' opinion forbids a McNary victory.

He must have a reputation, have done something to put him in the limelight. Republican Dewey won a conviction in a second-rate case, so the democrats made a first-rate catch in Kansas City, to prove they were still in the game.

Stock, Bond, Note Issues Approved

Refinance Plan for Power Company Is Okehed by Commission

Oregon's approval was given by Ormond R. Bean, public utilities commissioner, yesterday to a proposed stock, bond and note issue by the Mountain States Power company intended he said, to facilitate, improve its capital structure through interest savings. The company has been operating under the national bankruptcy act since December 31, 1937.

Bean said the company's amended reorganization plan had been set for hearing before the securities and exchange commission in Washington, DC, for today.

Issues approved by Bean included 53,044 shares of 5 per cent cumulative preferred stock of \$50 par value per share, 249,401 shares of common no-par capital stock, \$7,500,000 in first mortgage 4 1/2 per cent mortgage bonds due January 1, 1965, and \$600,000 in serial 2 per cent notes.

The stock would be issued to present holders of preferred and common stock of the company and to Standard Gas & Electric company in settlement of its claims against Mountain States. Proceeds of the other securities would be used to retire present outstanding 5 and 6 per cent first mortgage bonds.

Approval of the issues must also be given by the United States district court for Delaware.

After preliminary courses at Sandpoint, students are transferred to Pensacola training station.

Oregon Advantage Outlined by Hague

Knox Liquor Law Held not Perfect, but Better Than Others

Oregon liquor prices may seem high but they are not when compared with those charged in Washington and California, states which do not maintain complete monopoly system of control, J. J. Hague, state liquor administrator, told the Salem Lions club yesterday. He declared the Oregon commission's mark-up on its liquor was approximately 54 per cent as against 70 in the states he mentioned.

Speaking emphatically for the Oregon type of control of the liquor traffic, Hague pointed out that the state liquor stores earned a \$227,000 profit on a \$794,000 business last November alone and showed a net operating profit of 28.66 per cent after deduction of 5.3 per cent for operating costs.

The profits in the state liquor system show the possibilities for "one kind of graft" under private systems, Hague declared. "The Oregon system is not perfect, the Oregon liquor picture not 'lily white,' but conditions are 'better than they could be under any other system,' the administrator maintained.

In outlining the commission's operating setup, consisting of stores, licensing and enforcement divisions, Hague expressed the opinion the enforcement unit was the most important because "it takes care of the social end of our business." Changes now in progress are being made to eliminate use of "stool pigeons" and women in enforcement work and to coach the commission's licensees in the value of doing their own policing, he said.
