One of the 17 men (center, unidentified), accused of plotting to overthrow the US government, is shown in New York, between officers on his way toward arraignment. All of the accused pleaded innocent. Federal officers said the seizure of the 17 merely "scratched the surface" of a terrorist plot to overthrow the government.

Exams Scheduled By Civil Service

Civil service examinations for junior professional assistant to recruit young college graduates for junior professional and scientific position in the federal government have been announced by the United States civil service commission.

Optional branches included in the examination, all in the junior grade, are administrative technician, agricultural economist, agronomist, animal breeder, archaeologist, archivist, biologist, chemist, engineer, entomologist, forester, geographer, information assistant, legal assistant, librarian, metallurgist, meteorologist, olericulturist, plant breeder, poultry husbandman, public welfare assistant, range examiner, rural sociologist, social anthropologist, soil scientist, statistician, textile technologist and veterinarian. Salary is \$2000 a year.

Applicants must be under 35 and have completed a four-year college course leading to a bachelor's degree with major study in the field of the optional subject.

Applications must be on file with the US civil service commission at Washington, DC, before February 8. Full information may be obtained at the Salem postoffice.

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
