Portland Report On PUD Due Soon

The report of the state hydroelectric commission, based on petitions for creation of the proposed Portland people's utility district, probably will be released prior to Friday of next week, Charles E. Stricklin, commission secretary, announced here Thursday.

The Portland district would be the largest of any proposed in the state at the present time, based on population and assessed valuation. It was predicted that the proposal would be referred to the voters of Portland at the primary election May 17.

Sponsors of the proposed project indicated that the proposal would go before the voters regardless of whether the hydroelectric commission's report was favorable or adverse. The hydroelectric commission will conduct a hearing at La Grande Friday on petitions for creation of the Union county people's utility project.

Sunday Sale Act Title Completed

Ballot title for an initiative measure prohibiting the sale of a large number of commodities on Sundays was completed by Attorney General L. H. Van Winkle here Thursday and certified to the secretary of state.

Among commodities exempted under the measure are tobaccos, drugs, medicines, motor vehicle fuels and lubricants, newspapers, magazines and periodicals. The preliminary petition was filed by George Lightowler, Portland. In case a sufficient number of signatures are obtained the measure will go on the ballot at the November election.
