Of all the sons of Finland, 74year-old Jean Sibelius is the one who will be remembered longest. His father was an army surgeon, his mother the daughter of a clergyman. At the age of nine, Jean Sibelius began piano study and the study of violin at 15. He has been a prolific composer, with works ranging from symphonies, piano numbers, cantatas to compositions for small orchestras and tone poems. He wrote one opera.

Sibelius visited in the United States in 1916 and was awarded an honorary degree of Doctor of Music at Yale university. Beside this great work, the orchestra will play "Carillon" by
