January, 1930: The Trojans whipped Pittsburgh 47-14 in the Rose Bowl, Mexico President Pasqual Ortiz Rubio was hissed by Mexicans in Detroit, Russians were inspecting US farms and a cleanup drive was launched against college athletics by the NCAA following the Carnegie report.

Prohibition Commissioner Youngquist's wife was serving fruit juice cocktails. Col. Lindbergh was optimistic about the future of flying, the west's drys were both optimistic and the East liked the West 19-7 in the Kezar classic despite brilliant dashes by Cal's Bennie Lon.

Multnomah club outscored the 'Cats by a 27-24 count although Scates skidded home a dozen counts, Wesley Ketchell of Portland despatched Hector Ramirez and Robin Reed was bested by Henry Jones.

The Cougars clawed Hawaii U 28-7, ski fighting was at a standstill, the Salem airport commission accepted the newly constructed hangar and warming-up apron, and 10 died as two planes crashed at San Antonio.

General Primo de Rivera said democracy was to be restored to Spain, an Active club chapter was organized here and the Portland women's advertising club had a plan to plant 50 miles of roses between Salem and Portland.

**Loop Records, Salem Shivers.**

Ten years ago this month City Police Sgt. Asa Fisher had a hand-to-hand fight with a man whom he was serving a justice court warrant, Senator Sam Brown said he'd rerun and New Year's eve was on a Tuesday.

Rod Ballard bucketed 12 tallies as OSC beat the Bearcats 34 to 25, Maxie Rosenbloom despatched Leo Loski in the Garden, General John J. Pershing was giving consideration to a proposal that he run for the senate and a whole flock of guys wanted the justice of peace job here.

Oregon State posted a second win over the 'Cats, 39-26, Glen Sanford scored six points as Salem high tripped Vancouver 24-15, Gonzaga gouged Oregon 29-27 and Southern Oregon was buried under the deepest snowfall in 29 years.

'Slates' Gill was hospitalized here with a severe cold, W. H. Trindle was elected city attorney, Ed Cardinal carded 11 counters as WU bested Oregon 44-32 and the stock market was "still unsteady."

Tex Rankin set a world's record for outside loops, Princess Marie Jose of Belgium and Crown Prince Humbert of Italy were wed, Salem folk shivered in 23 degrees above zero weather and a gal in Havana arose from her coffin and walked.

**Snow Hits, Tillie Allasamee, 'Cats Lose.**

A decade ago this month Art "The Great" Shires scored another one-round knockout, Squee Kitchin wished a dozen digits as Salem high outthumped Woodburn 40-21, Dr. Clarence W. Spears was mentioned prominently as a possible successor to Capt. John J. McEwan at Oregon and DeNeffes of Eugene defeated the Bearcat basketballers 41-37 as Gord Ridings gathered 13 points.

Paw Perkins was having a heck of a time with little Gertrude, Dick Tracy wasn't born, the OSC Rooks eked out a 21-17 win from Salem high and Idaho's Vandals smothered the Beavers 41-23.

The Cougars nosed out Oregon 32-20, Henry Corbett announced he'd run for governor, the Salem high Clarion was awarded a cup as the best paper in schools with less than 500 registration, WU outpointed the Portland YMCA 48-40 as Scates tanked 17 and Oregon won from WSC 34-22.

Oregon State came back to crush Idaho 40-27, Dr. O. F. Willing and Don Moe of Portland were named to the US Walker cup team, Killer Burke was reported seen in the northwest and Oregon nipped the Vandals 40-37.

Seven inches of snow fell in Salem, Tillie the Toller was giving Mac the cold shoulder, Salem high smacked Uni high of Eugene 27-9 as John Bone bucketed nine, Idaho scored a 41-34 win over Oregon and WSC beat OSC again, 28-27.

**Spears Hired, 3 Alarms, Carnera Wins Ist.**

Back in January of 1930 the Salem city pappas were figuring a way to finance the removal of the city's snowfall, Southern Cal was rocked by earthquakes, Silvertown rollers were arranging a snow tournament and WU trounced Oregon 40-30 as Cardinal caged 12.

Eight fire alarms were answered by Salem firemen in one day as citizens overstated stories and turned youngster in efforts to combat the "unusual weather," OSC walloped the Huskies 34-24 and Oregon City shellacked the Vikings 34-18.

A silver thaw was predicted for Salem, Clarence W. Spears signed a five-year contract at Oregon, the Huskies turned the tables on OSC, 36-24, the naval limitation session of world powers got under way in London and Bolivia and Paraguay were on the verge of open warfare, Toots and Casper weren't born yet and today, the Oregon high whipped Salem 42-22, the Mexican government ordered its entire fleet out of Moscow, Gene Sarazen won the Agua Caliente open tourney and Primo Carnera scored a first-round knockout of Big Boy Peterson in his American debut.

**Hauk High, Reds in NY, Fags Panned.**

Ten Januaries ago Harold Hauk netted nine points as WU beat Linfield 24-21 in the NW conference opener, Washington walloped Oregon 37-23, Willamette's second win from Linfield was by a 56-7 count and Washington's second win from Oregon was by a 32-21 score.

The Portland chamber of commerce prey said a 13-month calendar would soon be adopted and Oregon State nosed out Washington 24-32.

Ten thousand Reds paraded in New York, floods threatened Salem in the van of heavy snowfall, OSC dumped the Huskies again, 19-7, and Jackie Wood kicked Killeen at Salem's armory.

**Oregon State Battlers Billed Here For Go With Elks Scrappers Friday Night in Card Held as Top to Date**

"One of the best amateur fistic lineups ever billed into the city," is the rating given by the Salem Elks club to its nine-bout boxing with Jim Dixon's Oregon State outfit here Friday night.

Headed by a heavyweight mix between Salem's Keller Wagner and Oregon State's Eberle Schultz, the all-American football guard, the card will feature the best Salem, Multnomah club of Portland and Chemawa battlers against the Beavers.

Schultz, 220-pound giant who was a standout on the Orange grid eleven that finished in third spot in the coast collegiate race last fall, and who but recently returned with the team from a successful two-game series in Hawaii, will pack a weight advantage of better than 30 pounds, but Wagner is expected to make up the deficit in pure punching power. To date, no one whom he has been able to hit has stood up under the Salem puncher's terrific right-hand wallop.

Zeb Smith, Salem lightweight, will attempt to accomplish what a gaffer did last year—take OSC's tall, smart boxing Carl Larsen into camp, Smith, looking better each time out, is figured to have both hands chockful in Larsen.

MAO's Bobby Volk, rated a probable successor to Tommy Meyer for coast lightweight honors, will tackle the Beavers' Merle Johnson, rugged youngster who staged two beautiful fights here last season, and Chemawa's wild-eyed middleweight, Johnny Cole, will take on OSC's Dan McKee. Five other bouts are being considered.

## Tall OSC Men Sink Vandals

**Orange Moves Ahead in Last Period to Get 20-18 Honors**

MOSCOW, Idaho, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Those tall, consistent men from Oregon State college, front runners in the Pacific Coast conference northern division basketball race, submerged the University of Idaho Vandals beneath a 20 to 18 score tonight.

It was Idaho's seventh conference defeat and the sixth victory for Oregon State, which has lost but one game, that to Washington State college.

A strategy of stalling, which went against them in the first half and led Idaho leading at the midpoint, 14 to 10, paid dividends for the OSC Beavers midway in the final period by tempting the anxious Vandals to foul.

Idaho was never behind in that opening stanza, although State tied the score at 3-all and 8-all. Both teams departed radically from the slam-bang northern division style to maneuver for certain shots and check closely on defense.

The Beavers won the war of waiting with brilliant defensive play through 15 minutes of the second half, holding Idaho pointless while they edged up to take a 15-14 lead on Valent's field goal and free throw.

The Staters, themselves, had gone scoreless for seven minutes, Hunter at last breaking from the foul line to tally as he raced under the basket.

Individual scoring honors went to Ouis Hilton, Idaho, with seven tallies. The Mandic brothers, Frank and John, scored five each to top Oregon State.

## Webfoot Mermen Top Washingtons

SEATTLE, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Pacific coast conference swimming champions from the University of Oregon paced the Webfoots to a 43 to 32 victory over the 1939 champions from the University of Washington before 1500 shouting fans today.

Sherman Wetmore, backstroke and free-style ace, Jack Dallas, breast stroke expert, and Pierce Mallory, free-style specialist, helped account for 22 of the winner's points, and figured in the two tank marks which were broken.

Although the final score was decisive, the meet wasn't decided until the final event—the 400-yard relay. A win for Washington in that event would have turned the tide to the Huskies, as they trailed only 36-32 going into the finals.

**Score 48-39 Victory, Led by Substitute Wright's Second Half Work**

Third game of the Willamette-Oregonians hoop series went to the Oregonians, 48 to 39, here last night, giving the Oregonians independent team, which covets the Oregon AAU championship, a two-to-one edge over the local collegians.

Willamette took the first of the series, 44-42; the Oregonians the second, 53-39.

The Bearcats held the talented ex-Oregon well in check the first half, which ended 20-17 in favor of the Eugene team, but with rugged Gord Wright muscling his way into the hoop for a trio of cringles and caging first of the first half, giving the Oregonians outplayed them in the second canto.

Sum Gallaher opened the scoring with a brace of buckets, on the first two shots fired by the Salem collegians, giving them a 4-0 advantage. Seventeen minutes of the first half ticked by before Anet, Gale, Johnson & Co. overtook the Bearcats, doing it on rebound buckets by Anet and Gale to go to the front, 14-13.

The Oregonians were never headed from there, and ran the advantage up to 42-30 at one point in the game. Otto Skopli and Howard Eberly were the only 'Cats consistent on their castoffs in the second half, each netting a trio of two-pointers. Skopli turned in top dunking performance for the locals, 10 points, while Gord Wright's 11, all garnered in the second session, was high for the game.

All-American Laddie Gale was far off his stride, gathering but two baskets in 17 attempts and missing the only two free tries he had. He, and Sum Gallaher of the 'Cats, were whistled from the contest.

**Oregon Shows Better Form**

**Huskies Taste 47 to 32 Defeat Making Series End Up One-All**

SEATTLE, Jan. 20.—(AP)—The University of Oregon, defending its basketball championship in the northern division of the Pacific Coast conference, regained some of its championship form tonight to defeat the University of Washington, 47 to 32, evening a two-game series.

Oregon's victory was a first-class example of the value of long arms in basketball. By shifting his starting lineup to include six foot, seven inch Hank Anderson, of Hines, Ore., and Archie Marshik, with a matching reach, in place of comparatively medium-sized Pavalunas and Ted Sarpola, Coach Howard Hobson gave his team just enough floor advantage to reverse the Friday night result, in which the favored Oregonians dropped the series opener.

Tonight, Oregon scored first on a basket in the opening minute by Captain John Dick, shifted from center to forward, a minute later, Washington evened the count, but Oregon promptly pulled away and Washington never made another serious threat. After three minutes, the score was 8-3; with 12 minutes left in the half, it was 15-7, and five minutes before the midway bell, it was 22-9. Washington came back with a little strength to close the gap to 27-14 at the rest period.

The second half opened in a burst of scoring that put Oregon ahead, 35-22, after five minutes. Washington then made its last bid, bringing the count to 41-30, but could do no better before the end of the game. Washington was shooting wildly at the finish.

Townsend, Oregon guard, was high for the evening with 13 points, followed by Dick with 12. The teams resume play at Eugene next Friday in another two-game series.
