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Paulson Trial Opens Monday

Lewelling to Hear Prune Contract Case With Norris Defending

Mark A. Paulson of Silverton will go on trial before Judge L. H. McMahan tomorrow morning on one of three indictments charging morals offenses involving boys at the state training school at Woodburn where for a time the defendant was a teacher of English.

In department two, Judge L. G. Lewelling will hear the case of Willamette Valley Prune association vs. Stanford Norris, in which the plaintiff charges that it advanced money and 90,000 strawberries to the defendant on the understanding that he would market his entire product through the association during 1938, 1939 and 1940.

The complaint charges that in 1939 the defendant sold a portion of his strawberries to Ray-Maling corporation in violation of the agreement.

Ray-Maling has been excused as defendant by the court after having paid a deposit to be disposed of subject to the decree.

Constitution Ban On Races Offered

Dog races, together with all forms of gambling games, would be prohibited in Oregon, under the provisions of a proposed constitutional amendment filed in the state department here Saturday.

The amendment, besides prohibiting dog races, refers specifically to slot machines, pinball games, punch boards, dart games, beano, and all other games and devices operated for the purpose of securing gambling or gaming.

The amendment would be self-executing.

The amendment was filed by the Oregon Civic Welfare association, of which Henry M. Hansen is president and Helen Ruth Buck secretary.

In case the sponsors obtain 25,531 signatures to the petitions by July 3 the amendment will go on the ballot at the November election.

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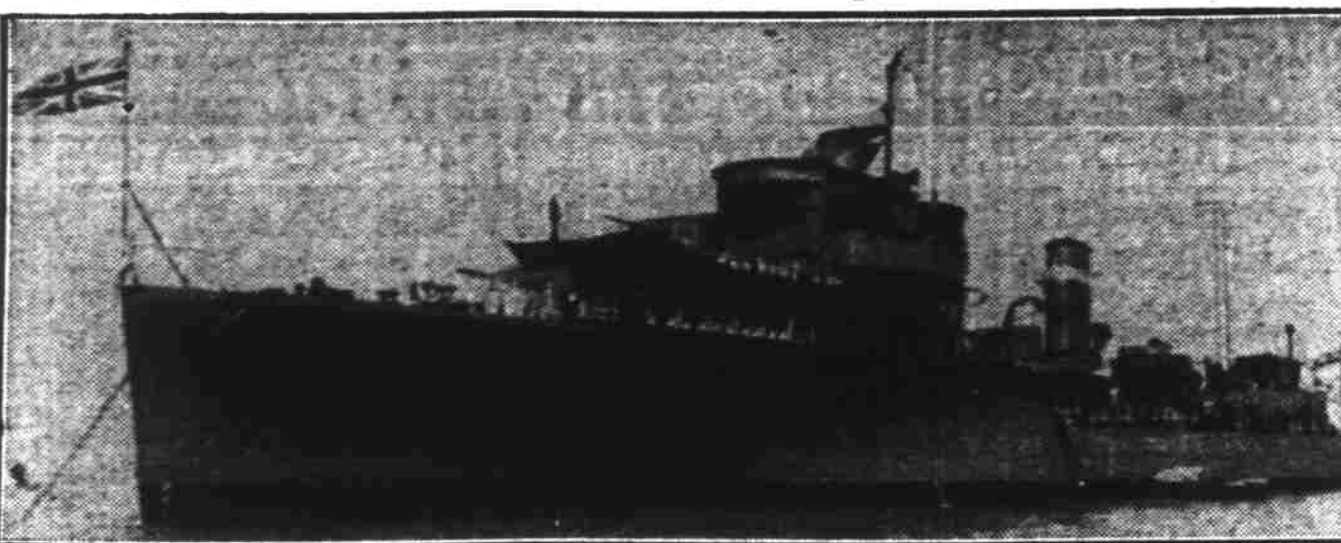
See Me Before Having Your Work Done

Revised plan for landscaping Salem's new postoffice grounds has been supplied Senator Charles L. McNary by the federal commissioner of public buildings, according to a telegram received here yesterday by George H. Riches, chairman of the Salem park board.

Senator McNary advised Riches a print of the new plan is being mailed to Postmaster H. R. Crawford here, and that local suggestions as to design and materials have been incorporated in the plan. A request for approval or disapproval accompanies the plan.

According to Riches, the first plan provided by the federal commissioner was not acceptable to local authorities as it contained a vast number of shrubs unsuited for the Salem locale. The new plan will be made available to anyone interested, according to McNary's message.

200 Die in Britain's Second Warship Loss in Four Days



Britain's twenty-second warship—its sixth destroyer—was lost January 23, when the swift Exmouth was "torpedoed or mined," according to an admiralty announcement, with the probable loss of all 200 officers and men aboard. The North sea sinking occurred four days after the destruction of the destroyer Greenville with the loss of 81 men. Same class as the Greenville, the Exmouth was completed in 1934 at a cost of \$1,320,946.
