Annual Jiggs Dinner Attracts Over Hundred Guests at Lebanon Church; Comic Characters Parts Portrayed

LEBANON—The Jiggs dinner, put on annually by the Men's brotherhood of the Methodist church, is gathering larger crowds each year, with this year's guests numbering over a hundred.

Begun about six years ago, the dinner and entertainment was an idea of the Rev. Lynn Wood, who was then pastor of the Lebanon church. The first Jiggs dinner was so successful that a repeat performance was requested immediately afterwards. All the parts in the Jiggs plays are taken by men. The first Jiggs was Dolph Southard, the first Maggie was Francis Glinther, the first Rosie was Earl Michelson, and the first Count Noaccount was W. P. Furth. Mr. Furth is the only one in the original cast who has played the same part each year, and his appearance is eagerly awaited in every year's production. "Maggie" always sings a solo, and this year her solo was sung by William Ellis, who has played the same part for several years. The audience happily finds no musical improvement in "Maggie's" singing; they would be disappointed if they did. Jiggs this year was Marion Kent, whose interpretation of the role ranked with that of previous "Jiggs," including L. E. Arnold's famous interpretations. Maggie's assistant this year was Myron Brown; her daughter, Don Schliske; the maid, Ralph Gilson; Ginty Moore, Marvin Genson; Jiggs' advisor, Merle Davenport; and the only woman in the cast was Mrs. Mervin Gilson, the music teacher. The costuming is always as ridiculous as possible, with Maggie favoring pajamas. The plot of the play is changed each year.

The dinner's main course is always the classic corned beef and cabbage, though salads, pie and other dishes are served also. H. D. Rhodenberger was in charge of the dinner, as in previous years. The program follows the dinner. Besides the portrayal of Jiggs' troubles, there were several musical numbers, including musical readings by Mrs. N. C. Lowe; a clarinet solo by Jean White; two vocal duets by Mrs. Mervin Gilson and Mrs. Virgil Horton; and a piano number by Mrs. Joel C. Booth. The Rev. D. Lester Fields was the general chairman in charge of the program.

Turner Council Votes To Redeem Bonds

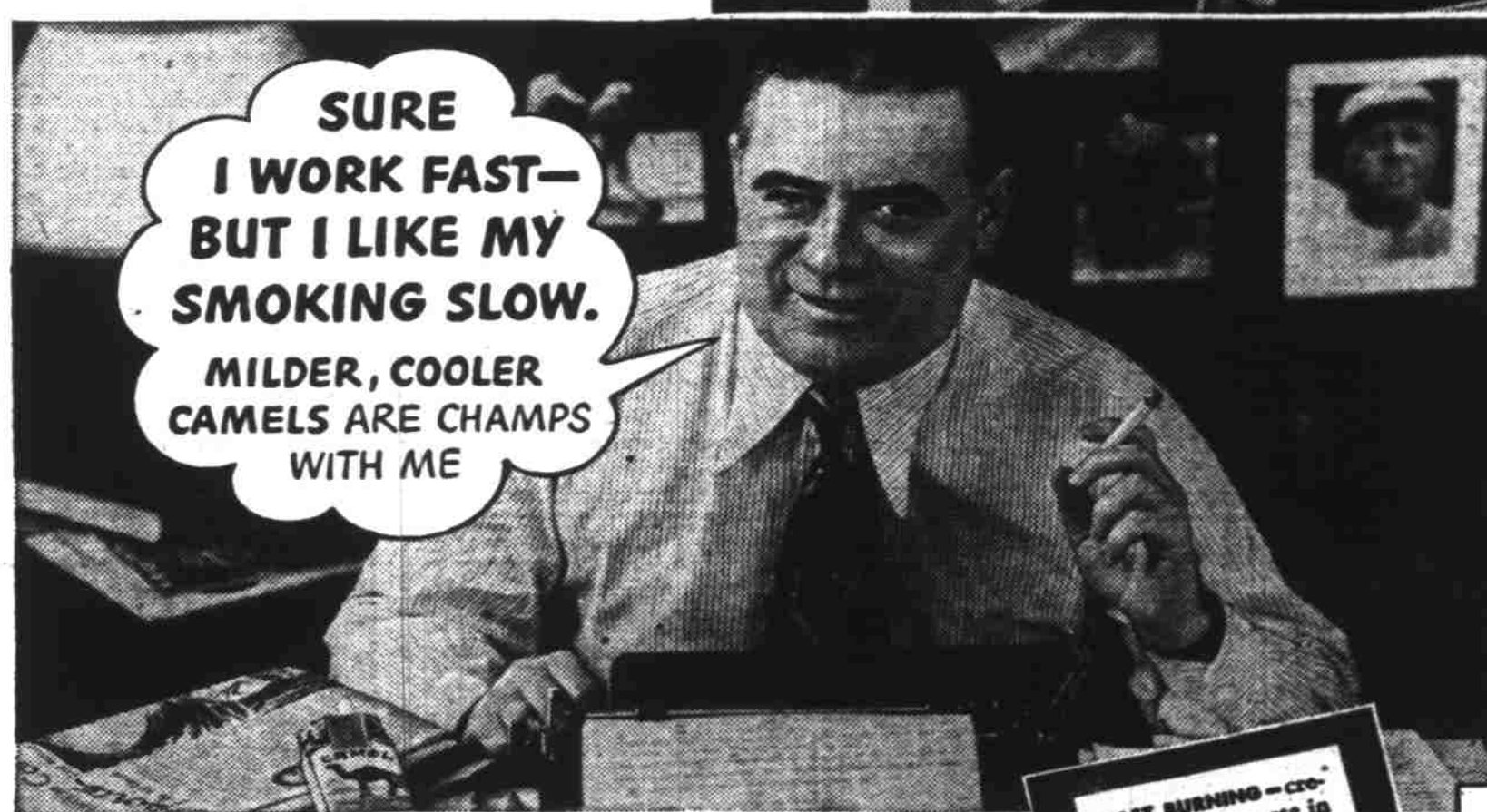
