Sauvie Project Okched—Application of the Sauvie Island drainage district for an easement over certain lakes on the island, for the purpose of constructing a levee, was approved by the state land board at a special meeting here yesterday. The levee will drain all of Little Sturgeon lake and Mouse lake and half of Markham lake, and will yield the state approximately 1240 acres of additional lake bed land. The value of the land was estimated at \$50 an acre. The levee will be constructed by the federal government in connection with a flood control program.

Jury Hearing Paulson Case

Two Ex-Training School Inmates, Dairy Head First Witnesses

Selection of a jury and hearing of preliminary testimony by three witnesses occupied the day yesterday in the trial of Mark A. Paulson, under indictment for alleged morals offenses involving boys at the state training school. The jury of three women and three men heard Jefferson Hayes of Condon and Chauncey Lyman of Enterprise, both former inmates of the state training school, testify concerning the charges against Paulson. Corroborative testimony was given by A. W. Jones, head of the dairy barn at the school.

The trial is not expected to close before tomorrow. In department two of circuit court, Judge L. G. Bacteria Chaser Spots Bad One; Remedy Is Swift

Food and dairy officials of the state department of agriculture took a big figuratively speaking, when the laboratory reported milk from an unnamed dairy in Oregon showed 694,000 bacteria per cubic centimeter.

That's 21 times the maximum allowed by law. A rest was ordered immediately. On his sample the laboratory's record showed 165,000 bacteria per cc.

Still too much—five times too much. So the department officials decontaminated the dairy and made a thorough inspection. The dairy was just one big bad spot, but worst of all was contamination in the milk house, due largely to carelessness in sterilizing the equipment.

That was considerably less than three weeks ago. Monday the laboratory tested another sample, and this was its report: 3200 bacteria on raw milk; 4500 on pasteurized milk. Both exceedingly low.

"Even the excuse for being so far in this case there was no change in equipment," commented Foods and Dairies Chief A. W. Metzger as he finished the tale.
