**Sugar Benefit Restored as Only Concession by Economyites**

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farm tenancy program and \$72,675.512 for surplus crop removal. The bill contained, however, the usual \$500,000.000 benefit payments to farmers who cooperate with the agriculture department's crop control program.

There was no record vote on final passage. The president's budget recommendation was \$735,925,519, representing the total of direct appropriations and reappropriations, but did not include a total of about \$112,000,000 of permanent appropriations and trust funds which went to make up a total of \$900,000,000 for agricultural purposes. The \$112,000,000 annually, however, was not a part of the bill the house passed.

**Farm Senators to Seek Restoration**  
The measure now goes to the senate where farm senators already have said they would attempt to restore all of the house cuts and, in addition, write in \$225,000,000 for farm parity payments.

By a teller vote of 149 to 135, the house refused to restore to the bill a \$25,000,000 fund for loans to convert farm tenants into landowners. The vote came after Chairman Jones (D-Tex.) of the house agriculture committee, in a dramatic speech during which he broke down and wept, pleaded with the members not to go back on the "plain homespun folks" struggling to rise from the status of tenants.

Representative Woodrum (D-Va.), a leader of the economyites, replied that there was a "homespun philosophy that men are supposed to support the government rather than have the government support the men."

The farm tenancy vote, unless reversed later in the legislative process, means the doom of the program under which the government has made 13,000 loans to tenants since 1937.

Tierney and Howard Latourrette, democratic national committeeman, were given the money for "advertising" on a trip to Washington, D.C. They planned to investigate the prospects of obtaining a federal building for Ashland.

In a letter to C. D. Miller, Ashland democratic leader, Tierney said he "merely planned to present postoffice case to the proper authorities; couldn't do more nor promise more."

## Multnomah Commissioners To Meet Wednesday, Name Successor to A. K. Higgs

The board of Multnomah county commissioners has been directed by Secretary of State Earl Smeal to meet in Portland next Wednesday to elect a successor to State Senator A. K. Higgs, who died there recently.

Higgs was appointed state senator from Multnomah county to serve out the unexpired term of George T. Eays, who died suddenly during the 1939 legislative session.

Higgs' successor will serve until early next January.

LONDON, Feb. 2.—(AP)—Britain's new export council will be charged with expanding exports of British goods to the rest of the world by more than one-third to pay war bills, it was reported reliably tonight.

Undiluted expansion, however, may not be the whole aim, for restriction was pointed to today as a possible weapon in the struggle with Germany for Rumanian oil.

Even as officials looked to the Balkan entente conference which opened today in Belgrade to resume in some clarification of Rumania's policy, it was said Britain planned to permit exportation of goods Rumania needed only to the extent that she sends oil to Britain.

Prime Minister Chamberlain yesterday announced an export council would set up to develop Britain's export trade.

ARCO, Idaho, Feb. 2.—(AP)—Death in the snow-capped Lost river mountains of south central Idaho today ended the terial coyote hunt of a United States biological survey marksman and his pilot.

Sheriff S. A. McLerran of Butte county, said the men were: Verne L. Oliver, 38, of Nampa, Idaho, pilot.

Guy E. Glens, 33, of Melba, Idaho.

He said their reason was "the doubtful authenticity of the documents, in the first place, and, in the second place, because there was absolutely no connection between the chairman of the special committee, Mr. Dies, and the purported letters which were later found to be forgeries."

## 'Chute Troops Scheme Fails

**Those Who Land Fail to Rally, Are Captured or Shot by Finns**

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They were about ten feet long and six feet wide, protected from above and on the sides by heavy metal plating. Machine-guns filled the sledges, protecting both the tanks and the closely packed ranks of infantry which followed.

On the flanks, smaller tanks heaved rapidly across the snows, billowing smoke columns through which the troops sought to maneuver.

All the tanks zigzagged in an effort to confuse the Finns.

The Finns however, were not to be misled. Their anti-tank guns stopped most of the armored sledges and, from concealed positions, they said they were able to repulse the other measures of attack.

There was no estimate of casualties.

The soviet onslaught was the answer Finland got to President Kyoesti Kallio's appeal Thursday for "an honorable peace."

Today, as on previous occasions, the Moscow radio broadcast a declaration, quoting the communist organ Pravda, to the effect that the red army will "fulfill its duty for the liberation of the Finnish people from their white guards under Mannerheim."

(Field Marshal Baron Mannerheim, commander-in-chief of the Finnish armies.) Moscow consistently has refused to recognize Kallio's Finnish government or its armies as anything but "Finnish bandits" or "Finnish white guards," and says it will deal only with a "people's government" which it inspired. Today's broadcast said the Helsinki government would be "destroyed" as an enemy of "the working people of Finland."

## Civil War Nurse Dies at Age 92

PORTLAND, Feb. 2.—(AP)—Mrs. Kate Neale, 92, a Civil war nurse, died of a heart attack here yesterday.

At 16, a German immigrant girl who had crossed the Atlantic to be with a homesick brother, Mrs. Neale helped nurse wounded soldiers at Carlisle, Pa., 30 miles from Gettysburg and headquarters for hospitalization. She lived in Portland 71 years.

Surviving are three daughters, including Mrs. Fred M. Bock, Salem, seven grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

## Boycott Opposed By Farm Groups

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 2.—(AP)—Heads of 14 Oregon farm organizations intervened today in a dispute between Swift and Company and the butchers' union, declaring a boycott on the company was un-American.

The union, seeking to force all Swift employees into its ranks, ordered all union retail butchers to boycott Swift and Company meat.

The farm leaders voted to oppose the boycott of their products "to the full extent of our power and resources." They contended many producers were faced with ruin because Swift handled approximately a third of all livestock produced and marketed in this area and a large percentage of all poultry and dairy products.
