Independence Residents Recalling Flood of 50 Years Ago When Mills, Warehouses Floated Down Stream

INDEPENDENCE—Old time residents of Independence were reminded here last week by the downpour of rain of the flood of 1890, which was exactly 50 years ago.

E. C. Portland, the editor of The West Side, which was changed later to the Enterprise, had been to Eugene and arrived back in Independence February 3, 1890, after experiencing considerable difficulty on his return trip on account of the high water. Extracts from his account of the flood in his pages, follow:

"At Blackdog, above Buena Vista, a warehouse has 8000 bushels of wheat in the water and Mr. Wills there has 10 fine horses and 19 head of cattle in his barn, which is surrounded. The warehouse of W. H. Murphy in which he has 10,000 bushels of wheat, is full of water.

"The water now stands in the main street of Independence and all over north Independence. The shipping house of the Farmers' warehouse floated away at noon, the office of the sawmill later; \$5000 worth of hard wood lumber at 3 o'clock. At 4 o'clock the Prescott and Vences sawmill floated away, taking the ferry with it. The railroad bridge at Rickreall is gone. Part of the wagon bridge at Dallas is gone. J. H. Murphy's last 2000 bushels of potatoes, the J. H. Murphy dwelling and barn are gone. The water came up to
