Molasses Makes Fine Flavor

Molasses in this doughnut batter give it a different and interesting flavor.

MOLASSES DOUGHNUTS (Makes 36)

2 eggs
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup light-colored molasses
1 cup sour milk or buttermilk
4 cups flour
1 teaspoon soda
1/4 teaspoon cloves
1/4 teaspoon ginger
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon shortening (melted)

Beat eggs, add sugar gradually and beat well. Then add molasses and milk and the dry ingredients which have been sifted together. Beat in the melted shortening. Chill the dough; then turn out onto a well-floured board and roll to 1/4-inch thickness, cut with a doughnut cutter, and fry in deep fat at 365 degrees until the doughnuts are well browned. Drain on soft paper.

For variety, roll plain doughnuts or molasses doughnuts in a mixture of 1/2 cup powdered sugar and 2 tablespoons of cinnamon.

Salmon Entree Good Dish

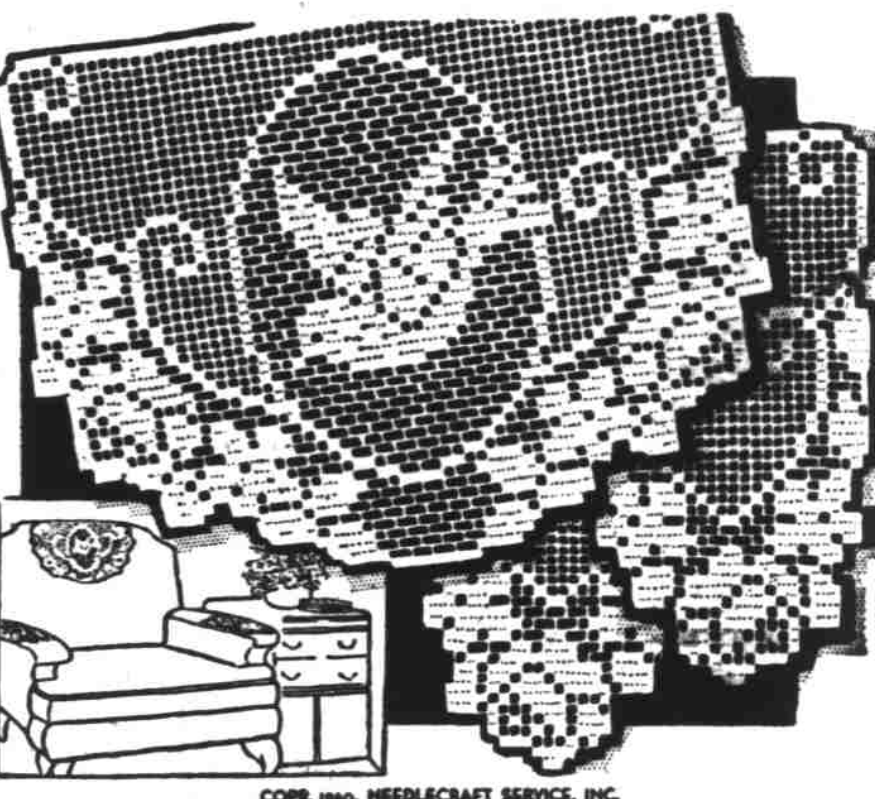
This, according to those who seem to know is called salmon week, and we'll just show them what we can do, by offering first a recipe for an entree using salmon from a can.

To make this entree, a can of salmon is turned out whole into a casserole, drenched with a tart creamy sauce (made simply by stirring lemon juice or vinegar into evaporated milk just as it pours from the can), sprinkle with finely chopped chives or a generous scrape of onion and baked till it's piping hot! What could be simpler.

SALMON PIQUANTE
1 pound can salmon
1 cup milk
3 tablespoons lemon juice
Chopped chives or few gratings onion

Turn can of salmon whole into a buttered baking dish. Stir lemon juice into milk. Pour over salmon and sprinkle with chives or a little grated onion. Bake in a hot oven 400 degrees about 25 minutes, or until thoroughly heated. Yield: 4 servings.

JANELLE'S DATE PUDDING

2 eggs beaten
1 cup sugar
1 tablespoon milk
2 tablespoons flour
1 cup dates
1 cup walnuts
1 teaspoon baking powder

Mix and bake in a slow oven for 25 minutes to half an hour. Serve with whipped cream. This batter is very thin before baked, and the pudding often rises quite high and then falls but the flavor is fine and the texture good even though not fluffy.

Spiced Dressing On Salad

Spicy boiled dressing goes nicely over meat or fish salads.

SPICY COOKED SALAD DRESSING

2 egg yolks
2 tablespoons oil
1 teaspoon dry mustard
1 tablespoon corn starch
1 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon sugar
Few grains cayenne
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup hot vinegar
2 egg whites

Beat egg yolks and stir in oil. Mix dry ingredients and add to first mixture. Add milk gradually and cook over hot water, stirring constantly. As it thickens, add vinegar. Cool and fold in beaten egg whites. Store in a glass jar in a cool place.

BEEF-CORN PUDDING

1 1/2 pounds ground beef
1 1/2 cups moist bread crumbs
1 1/2 cups whole grain corn
1 egg
2 teaspoons salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1/4 cup tomato catsup
1 1/2 cups milk
2 tablespoons butter
6 cooked carrots

Combine ground beef, corn and bread crumbs. Mix well. Add the well-beaten egg, salt, pepper,

Self Training In Speech Is Help

Ideas on what is needed by a college graduate to help her to get on in the business world have changed a good deal in the past generation. A few decades ago, the lady who chose speech as a college subject, was equipping herself to go out into the world and speak "Hiawatha," "The Little Polish Boy" and other masterpieces of elocution.

The modern woman, realizing the importance of voice quality and speaking ability in everyday life finds that public speaking is almost a necessity.

More than one tenth of all the students at Mr. Holyoke college have elected to take elementary speech this semester. Two new courses have been added to others offered in the department. Debate (not that most women need it) and scientific aspects of speech or how the wheels go 'round.

How often now-a-days a woman who enters public life, even in its mildest form, is asked to appear before clubs, committees or before the microphone, to discuss some cause. If well equipped, she's made herself a success.

If you find yourself wondering what your own voice sounds like, take yourself to the shop that has a recording machine, present the dollar and a half or so, and ask to have your voice recorded. Read the speech you have prepared and then have the record read back. You'll hear it's the voice of someone else.

Much can be done to correct one's own self with the help of these records. Listen to them, analyze what the matter (listing as if to someone else) and make corrections accordingly. The library can provide books that will aid in a home course in voice training. After a month or two of practice, read your speech again to the recording machine and note the improvement.

Scale singing, study of modulation and accents, correct pronunciation and inflection are great aids to improving speech, for both public and private use.
