

US Markets Have Holiday

Winnipeg Wheat Goes up;
London, Paris Stocks
Mostly Steady

(By the Associated Press)
Foreign security and commodity markets carried on in rather subdued fashion yesterday (Monday) as trading in most of the principal centers in the United States paused for Lincoln's birthday.

At Winnipeg, principal grain center open on the North American continent, wheat advanced $\frac{1}{2}$ to $\frac{3}{4}$ cent a bushel as reports from the winter wheat belt in the United States told of damage to crops by the weather.

Hogs at Chicago bounced up 10 cents a hundredweight and cattle maintained a steady undertone.

At London stocks maintained a fairly even balance despite the tendency to take profits, especially in the recently buoyant rails; transatlantic issues reflected the absence of aggressive demand and ended a trifle lower.

In Paris stock prices were well supported throughout most of the day on the bourse, but profit taking sales were pressed in late dealings and on the balance the general list was a shade lower. Amsterdam experienced a quiet, low session in the securities market.

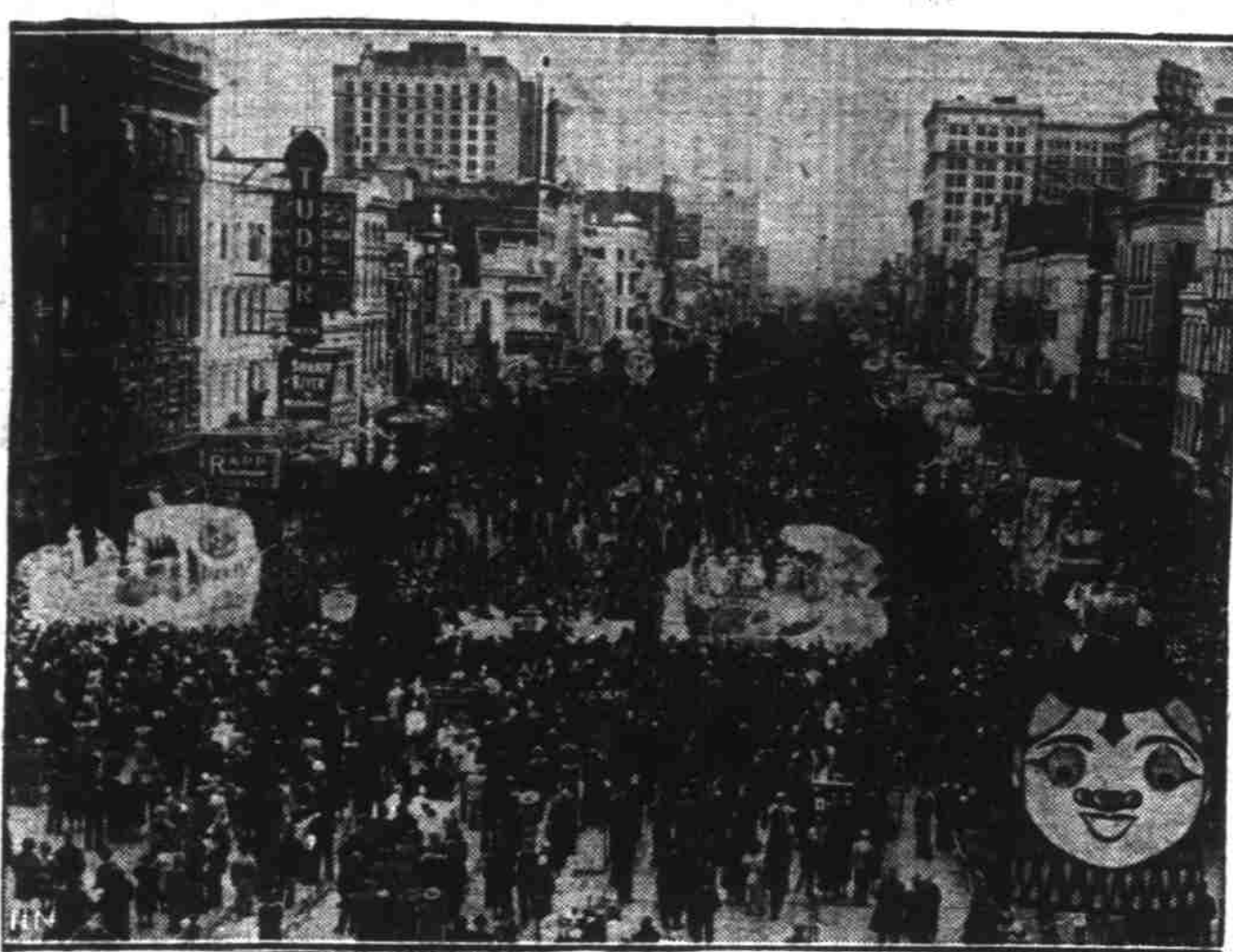
Waterbury, district manager of the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce, said imports totaled \$28,269,144, compared with \$27,608,098 in 1938.

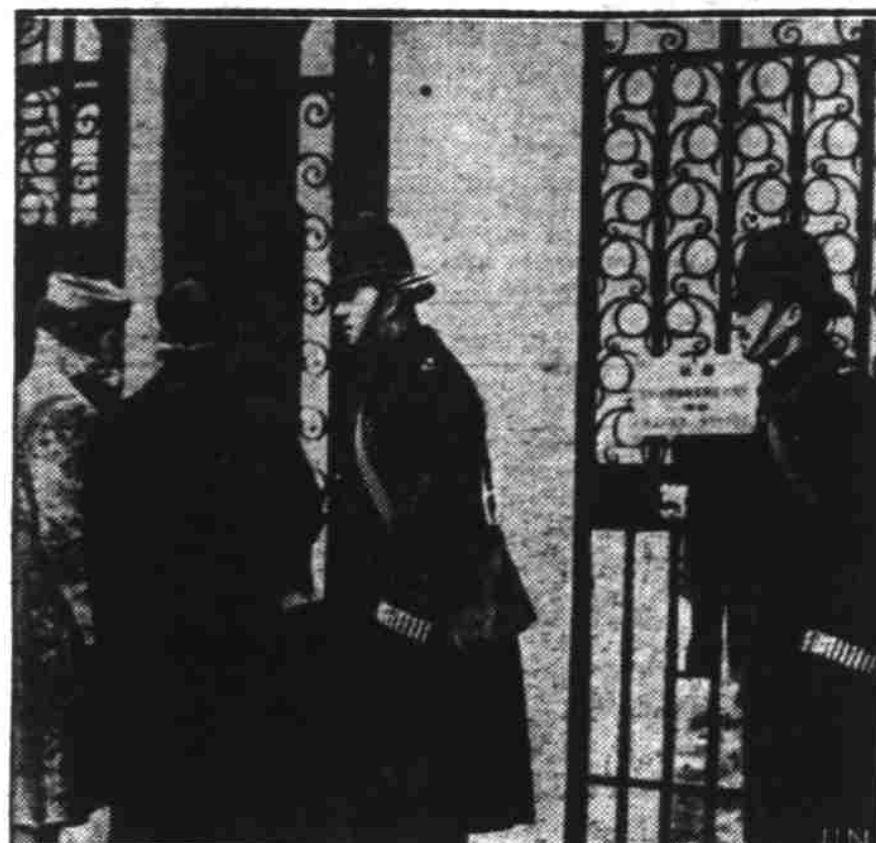
