Snowstorm Falls To Halt Operations
A snowstorm which swept the isthmus yesterday failed to retard military operations appreciably. The sky remained heavily overcast, however, and light flurries of snow during the afternoon raised Finnish hopes that a traditional February blizzard might yet come to their aid.

The extent to which the Mannerheim line has been penetrated in the bitter battle that has raged along the Karelian isthmus for almost four weeks was indicated by the nightly communique, which acknowledged that the fighting had reached the vicinity of Kamara.

The village is a station on the railway line from Leningrad to Viipuri, about 22 miles from the Russian frontier and about 12 miles from the Finnish seaport at the head of the Gulf of Finland which is the immediate objective of the Soviet drive. The Finnish high command asserted that all attacks in this sector had been turned back yesterday, but described the action as very heavy.

MOSCOW, Feb. 23.—(AP)—The 22nd birthday of the red army dawned today without the announcement—hoped for by many Russians—that Finland's Mannerheim line had been smashed.

The military communique from Leningrad reported only the capture of 21 more Finnish defensive positions on the Karelian isthmus and the bogging down of aerial operations by a Finnish blizzard.

Russians, however, had by no means lost hope of a decisive victory after 55 days of intensive operations against the well-built Mannerheim line. Soviet military authorities declare this deep fortified area is every bit as formidable as the Siegfried line on Germany's western frontier.

McMINNVILLE, Ore., Feb. 22.—(AP)—The Phi Kappa Delta's three-day intercollegiate invitational forensic tournament opened at Linfield college today, with 125 teams, representing 35 colleges and six western states, competing. The third round was completed by there were no eliminations. The field will not be narrowed until completion of the seventh round, the committee in charge announced. Selection of the winner will be made Saturday.

Modoc Unit Work Sought by Pierce
WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—(AP)—Representative Pierce (D, Ore.) expressed hope today the reclamation bureau and the biological survey would recommend to congress appropriation of \$1,000,000 to carry on work on the Modoc unit of the Klamath reclamation project in Oregon.

Pierce said the amount was originally recommended by the two agencies but was eliminated by the budget bureau. The geological survey came into the picture through the draining of Tule lake. After conferring with the bureau, Pierce went to Secretary Ickes and said he found the secretary sympathetic with his efforts to get the project reinstated. Pierce said it was needed in the "dust bowl" area of Klamath county and he was hopeful the recommendation to congress would be forthcoming.

ASCAP President To Face Charges

Involve Usual Procedure of Agency; Montana Warrant Issued

PHOENIX, Ariz., Feb. 22.—(AP)—Gene Buck, president of the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers, was arrested at a resort hotel today by Sheriff Lon Jordan who said he had a telegraphic warrant from Missoula, Mont., charging Buck with attempted extortion.

The ASCAP president was later released on \$10,000 bond. Buck after a telephone conversation with his attorneys in Los Angeles, said he would fight extradition.

Sheriff's deputies were reported to have left Missoula with extradition papers. In addition to the attempted extortion charge, a felony, Buck also is accused of attempting to obtain money under false pretenses and conspiracy to extort, both misdemeanors.

In Missoula, county Attorney Edward T. Dussault said the warrant against Buck was the same as that issued for Buck and other officers of the ASCAP which authorities in New York declined to serve.

Trawler Is Sunk By Black Raiders

The naval trawler Solon also was bombed and raked with machine gun fire, but the attacking planes were driven off by sharp fire, and the boat returned safely to land.

The Fifehire was the 14th British naval trawler officially reported sunk thus far in the war, but the first to be lost from an aerial bombardment. Fifteen larger naval vessels have been lost.

The busy royal air force, which Prime Minister Chamberlain only yesterday said was now on the verge of meeting attacks of any size and strike back, was reported to have attacked German torpedo boats in continuing reconnaissance flights over Germany's northwestern sea base of Borkum and Helgoland.

Accounts of the German air activity said the Nazi warplanes swept up and down the east coast of England and Scotland in an intensification of efforts to cut Britain's food supply lines, which the British press is calling "vengeance raids" in the attack of the British destroyer Con-sack on the German vessel Altmark off Norway last Friday night, in which 299 British prisoners were rescued.

One of the German bombers shot down by the British crashed in a farm field on the outskirts of Coldingham, near St. Abb's head, southeastern Scotland, while the other plunged into the sea off the coast of Northumberland.

Bombs in London West End Hurt 8
LONDON, Feb. 22.—(AP)—Two bombs, believed to have been planted by Irish Republican Army terrorists, exploded to-night in London's west end.

Eight persons were injured seriously by one explosion in busy Exford street, main west end artery. Windows in three stores were smashed.

The second blast wrecked a men's lavatory at the Marble Arch, at Oxford street and Hyde park. No one was injured there. Police believed the bombs were intended to renew the "terror campaign" which preceded the execution of two IRA zealots at Birmingham on February 7.

Japanese Puppet Army in Collapse
HONGKONG, Feb. 22.—(AP)—Collapse of a Japanese puppet army of Chinese soldiers, landed on the Fukien coast to fight Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's forces, was reported today by Chinese dispatches.

The commander of the puppet army, General Huang Ta-Wel, these sources declared, was put aboard a Japanese warship as a prisoner of war, following multiple among his troops.

Crusading Jurist To Ask Governor Oust Prosecutor

DETROIT, Feb. 22.—(AP)—Governor Luren D. Dickinson will be asked Friday to remove from office Duncan C. McCrea, Wayne county prosecutor indicted with 14 other persons on charges of conspiracy to operate and protect a \$1,000,000-a-year baseball pool.

Circuit Judge Homer Ferguson, whose one-man grand jury inquiry into relations between metropolitan law enforcement officers and the underworld resulted in the indictment, announced today his intention to make the request to the governor.

McCrea, Fred W. Frahm, former Detroit police superintendent, and Harry P. Colburn, the prosecutor's chief assistant, were accused, with two detective lieutenants and two detectives, of accepting money and gratuities to protect operations of the nation's sports junior baseball pool. Besides the 15 names as defendants, four were named as co-conspirators, but not defendants.

McCrea, Frahm and Colburn eluded arrest today, but Detective Chief Paul H. Wencel said "They all are, or were, law enforcement officers and I believe they will give themselves up of their own accord Friday."

Television Relay Success Claimed

Toughest Problem Solved by Engineers; Ether Hookups Planned

SCHENECTADY, N.Y., Feb. 22.—(AP)—Successful television relay, with which engineers have struggled for years, was declared an actuality tonight by a General Electric company official.

Solution of this chain, or relay, problem generally is credited with delaying widespread inauguration of television. Otherwise reception theoretically is limited to the visual horizon.

High in the Helderberg mountains, near Schenectady, engineers attacked the problem. For weeks a television station there has picked up and rebroadcast programs put on the air from atop the towering Empire State building in New York City.

Tonight Dr. W. R. G. Baker, manager of the General Electric television and radio department, termed the experiment "highly successful."

"Within a short time," he asserted, "people in Chicago may see the sun set in New York while it is still high above the horizon in Chicago."

Unlike radio chains, which deliver programs to stations for rebroadcast by wire, the predicted television would go into the nation's homes by a series of aerial pickups and rebroadcasts.

Without the relay operation each television station must operate independently in a restricted area.

Park Project Is In 'Study' Stage

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—(AP)—Senator McNary (R, Ore.) said he was notified by the national park service the proposed national monument in the Cascade mountains of Washington and Oregon was still in the "study stage" and it was unlikely any report would be made to the president soon.

The officials told the senator that they had encountered many complications in their study of the proposal that the park be established by executive order. McNary sent the information to George E. Richards, secretary of the Enterprise, Wash., chamber of commerce, who had written the senator saying "a great many interests" opposed creation of a Cascade national park. He said gaming, recreation, livestock and lumber interests believed such a park was undesirable.

McNary said the park service was expecting daily a report on the proposed Snake river park in Walla Walla county, Ore.

Mahoney Praises McNary Chances
PORTLAND, Feb. 22.—(AP)—President Roosevelt does not want a third term but may run if an international crisis occurs around convention time, Willis Mahoney said today.

"The democratic national convention unquestionably will nominate him unless he makes a statement—and I doubt if he is going to make any announcement before the convention," Mahoney, Oregon's 1938 democratic nominee for the United States senate, commented upon his return from his Washington, D.C., law office.

Mahoney believed that if the convention is deadlocked the choice may fall to Secretary of State Cordell Hull, who could unite Garner, Farley and Roosevelt factions.

Meanwhile, the Railway Labor Executive's association, composed of officials of 30 out of 21 railway labor organizations, publicly endorsed 22 members of the senate for renomination in approaching state primaries.

The Weir appointment was announced by John D. M. Hamilton, the chairman of the republican national committee, with a statement which noted that Weir and his company, National Steel corporation, were "famous for having made a profit every year during the depression."

Weir, chairman of the corporation's board of directors, and president of the Iron and Steel institute, has been a sharply-spoken and aggressive opponent of the new deal for years. Repeatedly he has been embroiled with new deal agencies and with the CIO.

The organization, however, turned thumbs down on one senator who is up for renomination, Senator Burke (D-Neb.). Burke's opponent, Gov. R. L. Cochran, was endorsed instead.
