SCALLOPED CORN-OYSTERS 1 quart corn 1 pint oysters

Butter and milk Salt and pepper

Drain liquor from one quart of corn and one pint of oysters. Save oyster liquid, Butter a deep dish, cover bottom with cracker crumbs, put in a layer of corn. then one of oysters. (If oysters are large, either chop in small pieces or in half.) Season with salt and pepper and generously dot with butter. Repeat until dish is full. Cover top with buttered cracker crumbs. Pour milk to which the liquor from the oysters has been added over the mixture in the dish until you can just see it. Place in oven and bake one hour. If browns too quickly, cover. Serves eight.


