

School Contracts To Be Considered

Silverton School Board to Hire Principal at Next Meeting

SILVERTON—Teachers' contracts in the Silverton schools will be discussed on March 20, according to the decision reached by the Silverton school board at its regular meeting Wednesday night. Of prime interest at Silverton is the hiring of a new principal to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Herman Kramer who will go to Hood River. A number of applications for this position have been received.

The calendar for the remainder of the school year was arranged Wednesday night and includes the usual Easter vacation March 22 to March 25 inclusive. May 31 was set as termination date for the school year with the tentative commencement day set for May 30 and baccalaureate for May 26. The tentative graduation list submitted by Kramer contains 115 names. Some of these will likely not be graduated, however, Adams added.

A call for bids for the wood will be made within two weeks, the minutes show. The board also arranged to purchase a number of fire extinguishers to be used in places now needing them. These include the new high school stage, the manual training rooms, the lunch rooms and the home economics room.

Stayton Census Is Anticipated To Reach 1100

STAYTON—Approximately 1100 will be in the 1940 census of Stayton, according to the estimate prepared from records in the city water department. Mt. States Power company and the postoffice.
