

City Accepts Park Project

Parking Strip Work at Lebanon Will Be Done by NYA Labor

LEBANON—When the city council met Tuesday night it accepted the plan of the park board for an NYA project to spade, seed and fertilize parking strips. Application blanks have been prepared for the property owners who wish to sign for this service. The labor will be paid for by the NYA but materials, tools and supervision will have to be met by those receiving the service. It is to cost 7 cents per lineal foot. Chester Nelson, the NYA supervisor, was here from Salem Tuesday to interview applicants for the position of local supervisor and to enroll youths between the ages of 18 and 24 who wish to do this work. Twelve enrolled. The boys will work 50 hours a month, 10 hours of that time is to be spent in instruction. They will be paid \$15 a month.
