"An outlet for power is not going to be found there," he told the house, adding that when the government sought to amortize the investment it was "not going to get its money back."

Declares Lewiston Doesn't Want It. Dirksen, urging his amendment, asserted "Lewiston doesn't want this Bonneville power, anyway. The people out there and Idaho's governor have indicated that they want to use some of their own power."

He estimated the cost of the Pasco-Pendleton line at \$1,400,000 and said that it plane contemplating its extension to La Grande, Ore., went through another \$1,000,000 would be added to this.

"As a purely balance sheet proposition it seems to me," he said, "that this ought to be prevented. These lines cannot be justified on the basis of market outlets and should not be undertaken unless there is some reasonable hope of eventually recovering the investment made out of the pockets of the people."

Told by Representative May (D-Ky) that the government's Tennessee valley development had "practically destroyed Tennessee from the tax standpoint," Dirksen replied that the problem of tax displacement would not arise in Bonneville territory "in the same proportion."

"What I contend," he concluded, "is that in such a sparsely settled country we ought to wait a while and see what develops."

Representative Rankin (D-Miss), declared that Dirksen's amendment was "playing into the hands of the most corrupt monopoly this country has ever seen—the power trust."

Representative Pierce (D-Ore), also discussed Dirksen's arguments as those of private interests. Pierce denied Dirksen's assertion that construction of the two lines would provide duplication of facilities, declaring that existing lines were of a low-voltage type, from which there was heavy energy loss, and that new high voltage lines were badly needed.

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Its sponsors might also prove a burden. Commissioner Melson indicated that the nearness of the project to the city would make it desirable for the county, which now has difficulty in finding tasks for relief workers within the environs of the city.

Both he and Mayor Chadwick agreed that the first step toward ultimate improvement of the route would be a survey of expense in respect to changes thought desirable.

PUD Vote May 17 Assured Portland

PORTLAND, March 7.—(P)—Portland was assured today of a vote May 17 on establishment of a people's utility district.

James W. Gleason, county registrar, certified 5313 of 7512 signatures on petitions asking the vote. Only 4760 signers were needed.

The issues on the ballot will be formation of a PUD, election of five directors to administer it, a survey of possibilities of acquiring distribution systems and levying of a property tax not to exceed 2 mills a year for not more than five years for administrative purposes.

A separate vote will be required on issuance of revenue bonds to acquire distribution facilities.
