Stock Market Lacks Trend

Leaders Are Off Balance; Specialties Strong; **Average Unchanged**

NEW YORK, March 11-(AP)-Specialties stood up fairly well in today's stock market but the general run of leaders was slightly off balance throughout.

Aircrafts were up the greater part of the day, but most of these cancelled gains at the last as short selling was reported in the group.

While business items were fairly cheerful here and there. speculative forces inclined to step lightly pending results of the Russian-Finnish · peace negotiations which, up to the close, had Wall street confused.

Price changes were spotty from the start and never at any time developed a definite trend. Small fractional variations either way ruled at the last. Dealings slowed after the first hour.

The Associated Press average of 60 issues was unchanged at 50.1. Transfers totaled 587,680 shares compared with 745,050 last Friday.

Both U. S. Steel and Bethle hem eended down a trifle despite an estimated upturn of .1 of a point in this week's mill operating rate after eight consecutive weekly declines.

Packard was the liveliest performer, up ¼ at 4, a new 1940 American Telephone. peak. Brooklyn-Manhattan Transit and Celanese edged into new high ground for the year.
