Talk Change of Sponsors

Flaxarians Will Discuss Relinquishing Job to Larger Club

MT. ANGEL—Another Flax festival will call the people of the surrounding country to Mt. Angel during the coming summer if the wish of the Mt. Angel business men is carried out. A vote in favor of again holding the celebration was taken at the Business Men's club meeting Monday noon and showed almost unanimous approval.

A discussion regarding the sponsoring of the festival favored backing by the Business Men's club rather than the Flaxarians, who put on the show last year, since, it was argued, the Flaxarians were a branch of the Business Men's club. Walter Smith, president of the Flaxarians, said the matter would be brought up at the meeting of his organization Monday night.

President Holmes appointed T. B. Endres, chairman, Lee Withers, Val Eberle and A. J. Butsch, to represent the business men at a meeting with a similar group of Flaxarians for the purpose of arriving at a satisfactory agreement. A report is to be made at the next meeting of the club.

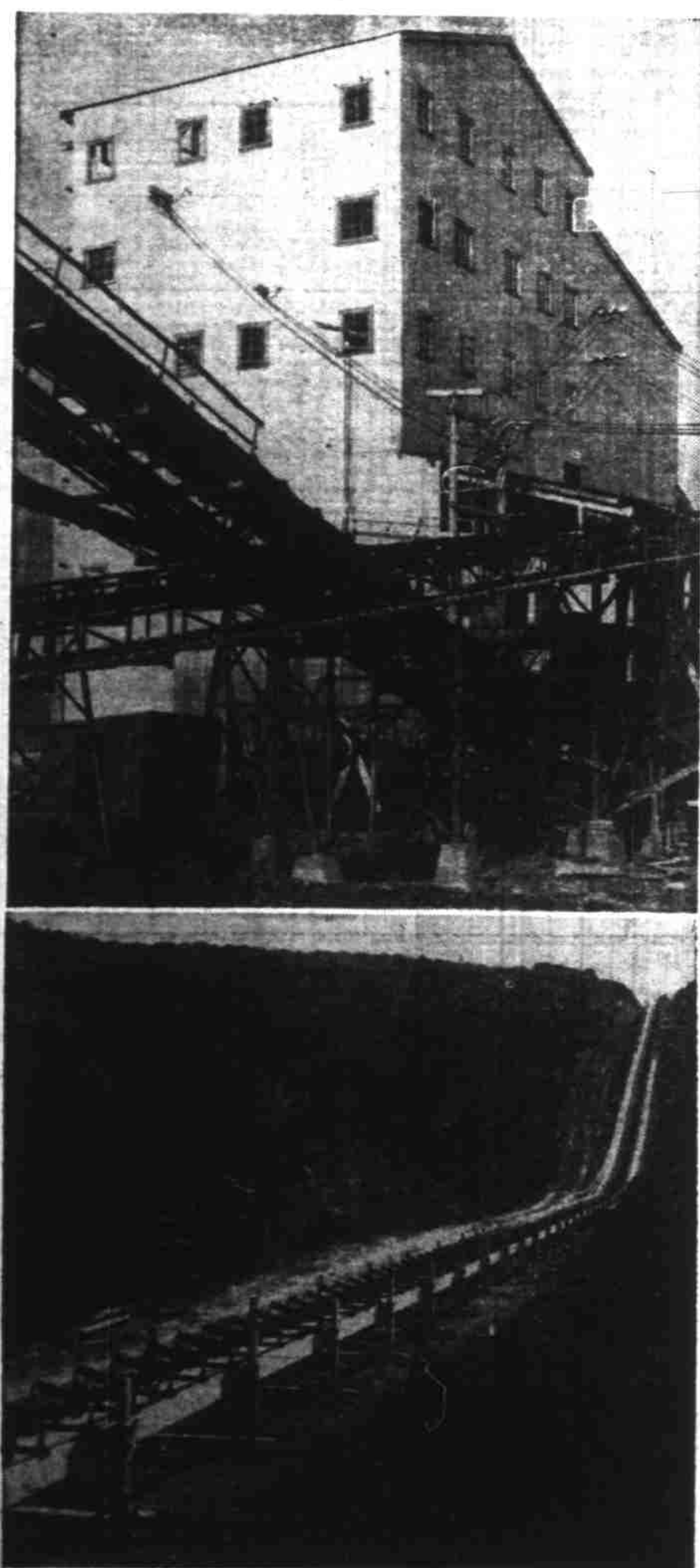
The club went on record as favoring the sending of a telegram to Senators McNary and Mott to ask for the retention of the CCC camp at Silver Creek Falls.

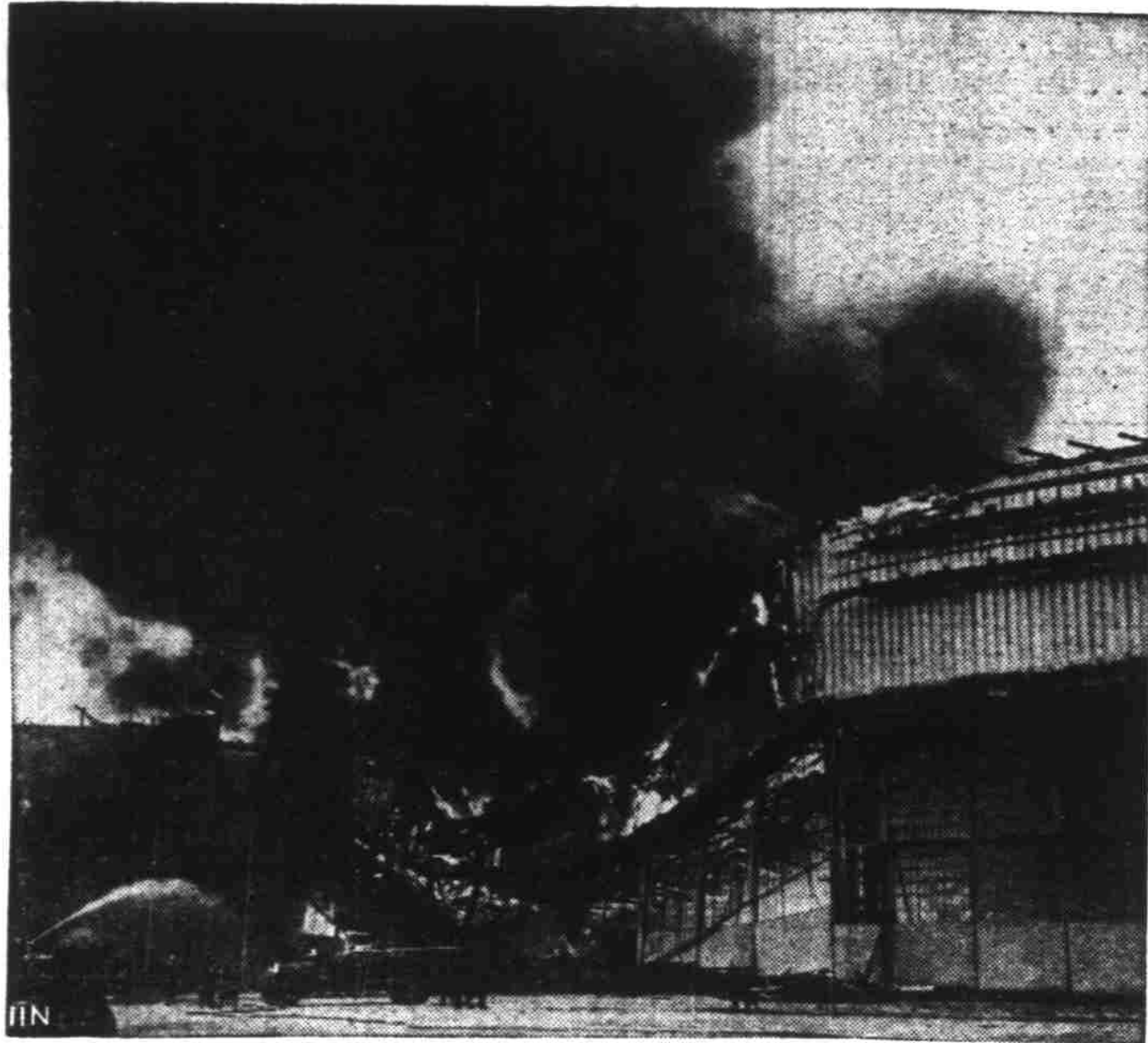

Gravel Rides Belt, Shasta Mill



Manufacture of the 5,000,000 cubic yards of concrete to be placed in northern California's Shasta dam will require more than ten million tons of sand and gravel, called aggregate, which is washed and screened in a six-story mill, shown above, constructed especially for the task. Raw stock is excavated from a river deposit near Redding, Calif., will be transported on a ten-mile system of belt conveyors, section of which is shown below creeping across a hill. 80 Per Cent of Nation's Libraries Started by Women's Clubs, State Federation President Tells Club

Mrs. Peterson's subject was "Golden Opportunities," in keeping with the 50th anniversary year of the organization of the national federation.

The Oregon Federation, she said, leads in the scholarship loan fund, and it assists materially with the Downbecher hospital at Portland and the children's farm home near Corvallis. Mrs. Peterson mentioned that the Silverton Women's club had organized the first junior club in the state.

Mrs. A. P. Solle, federation publicity chairman, gave a history of

the Silverton club. Mrs. J. J. Lewis sang, accompanied by Irene Morley Franke. Greetings were read and a gift presented from Mrs. Ella Pare Hosmer of Fullerton, Calif., now president of the Silverton club. Mrs. E. S. Forest Project Starts, Detroit

325,000 Douglas Firs Will Be Set out in Three Regions

DETROIT — The second large reforestation project in the area of the Willamette National forest in the last two years will start Wednesday when 60 boys from the Mary's creek CCC camp start a three weeks job of planting 325,000 two-year-old Douglas fir seedlings. Trees will be planted in three regions, French creek area, Humboldt and Marion Forks. The percentage of growth of these seedlings depends upon the summer following planting and a check of the trees will be made this fall. It takes approximately 57 years for a tree to reach cutting maturity for lumber.

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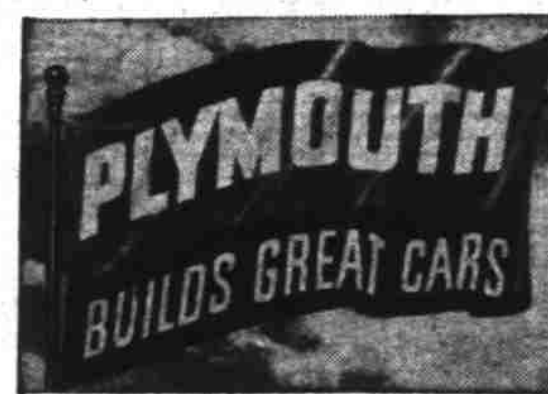
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
