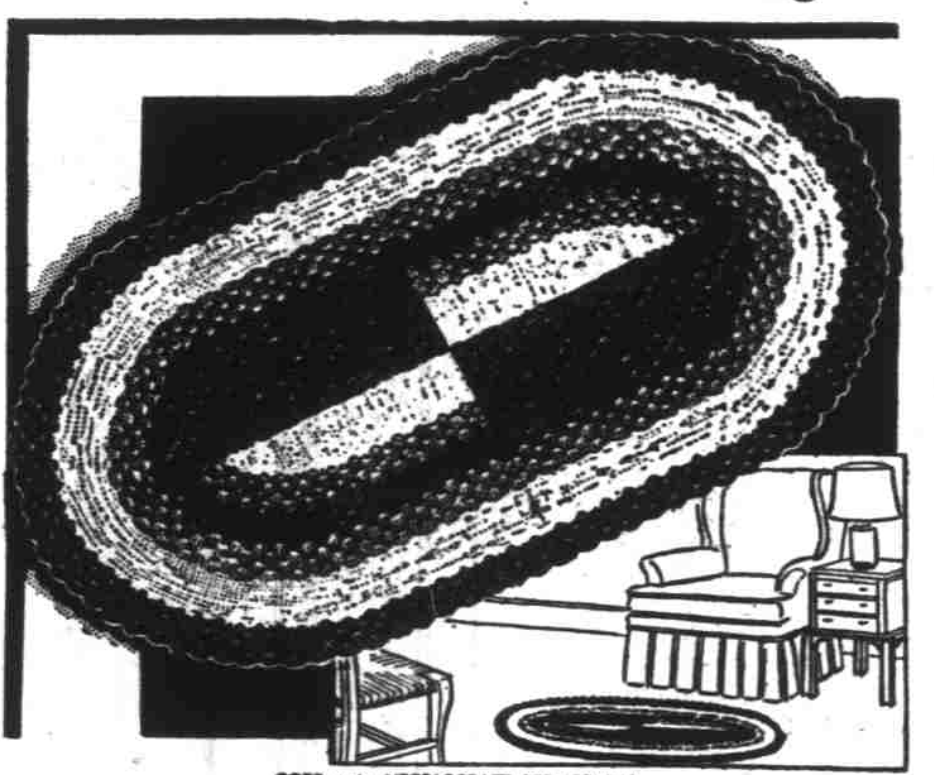

Today's Menu Top of the Morning—With Special St. Patrick's Day Breakfast

Codfish served in a casserole becomes a fine dinner dish.
Escalloped codfish
Buttered new peas
French fried potatoes
Date bars-whipped cream

ESCALLOPED CODFISH
1/2 pound codfish
2 cups milk
1 cup cracker crumbs
2 hard-cooked eggs
2 tablespoons butter
Soak codfish for 2 hours in cold water. Drain. Cut into pieces and simmer for 15 minutes in fresh water, drain and flake. Pour milk over 1/2 cup of cracker crumbs. Slice eggs. Combine fish with eggs and soaked cracker crumbs, dot with butter and bake in a moderate (375 degree) oven for 30 minutes. Serves 6.

Fruit, Vegetable Salad Good

A jellied salad that is inexpensive but well worth serving frequently is this:

BANANA GELATINE SALAD
1 package lemon gelatine
1 1/2 cups hot water
1 teaspoon vinegar
Pinch of salt
1 cup shredded carrots
1/2 cup diced bananas
1 teaspoon chopped sweet pickle
Mayonnaise
Dissolve gelatine on hot water

And the poet might have added that "after ye've got yer man, feed him a good cup of coffee to hold him." Use shamrock place cards and put a bit of green on the table—then be sure the coffee's hot as well as the boxty; add saucages, raisin bread toast (with gooseberry jam) and you'll be having the real morning atmosphere of old Erin. Make the coffee in the American manner (that means strong enough with one heaping tablespoon of coffee to each measuring cup of water) then follow this "boxty" road to Dublin's favorite breakfast.
