Bread Pudding Is Elegant Dessert

A twist of the cap of a jar of preserves and a bread pudding becomes an elegant company dessert.

STRAWBERRY MERINGUE PUDDING
1/2 cup sugar
1 teaspoon salt
2 eggs and 1 yolk, slightly beaten
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
1 tablespoon lemon juice
2 tablespoons butter
2 cups milk, scalded
1 cup stale bread cubes
1/2 cup strawberry preserves
1 egg white, unbeaten

Combine sugar, salt, and eggs and egg yolk. Add lemon rind and juice. Melt butter in hot milk and add gradually to egg mixture, stirring vigorously. Pour into buttered baking dish; let stand 15 minutes. Set dish in pan of hot water and bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) 35 minutes. Before removing from oven, place egg white and preserves in bowl. Beat with rotary beater until mixture is stiff and creamy. Pipe on pudding and bake 15 minutes longer. Yield: 6 portions.

Flavor, Color of Icing Good

Strawberry flavoring in an icing is good taste and the color gives nice appearance to the cake's topping.

SEVEN-MINUTE STRAWBERRY FROSTING
1 egg white, unbeaten
1/2 cup strawberry preserves
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg

Beat of all ingredients in top of double boiler, beating with rotary beater until thoroughly mixed. Place over rapidly boiling water, beat constantly with rotary beater, and cook 7 minutes, or until frosting will stand in peaks. Remove from boiling water. Beat until thick enough to spread. Yield: Frosting for cake tops and sides of two 9-inch layers, or top and sides of 8x8x2-inch cake, or about 2 dozen cup cakes.

Cookies Flavored With Chocolate

Chocolate's always a favorite, and when in cookies that are simple to prepare and will keep a while, the flavor has assured popularity.

CHOCOLATE ICE BOX COOKIES
4 cups sifted cake flour
4 teaspoons double-acting baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 cups softened butter or other shortening
1 1/2 cups sugar
2 eggs, unbeaten
4 squares unweetened chocolate, melted
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 cups broken walnut meats

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift again. Combine butter, sugar, eggs, chocolate and vanilla, beating with spoon until blended; then add nuts. Add flour gradually, mixing well after each addition. Divide dough in two parts; shape in rolls 1 1/2 inches in diameter, rolling each in waxed paper. Chill overnight, or until firm enough to slice. Cut in 1/2 inch slices; bake on ungreased baking sheet in moderate oven (350 degrees) 10 minutes, or until done. Makes 7 dozen cookies.
