

Dewey Attacks WPA, Elections

Asserts Relief Handled in Political Manner by new Dealers

CHICAGO, March 28.—(AP)—Thomas E. Dewey carried his campaign for the republican presidential nomination to the huge Chicago stadium tonight with a declaration that the new deal's record of WPA administration during recent elections constituted "a calendar of unpunished crimes."

"It is a story of men and women held up for contributions for political campaigns, thrown on relief and off relief to meet the election needs of a power-hungry administration," he asserted. "Under the threat of loss of desperately needed aid, tribute was extorted. That tribute was paid in food out of the mouths of hungry men, women and children."

"It is a calendar of unpunished crimes—broken covenants, disloyalty to the constitution, abuse of power, intimidation, coercion, extortion and larceny—all committed against the underprivileged and helpless unemployed. . . . Never before has an American political party demanded by such brazen abuse of the needy."

In his prepared indictment, the New York prosecutor contended that the "shame of the new deal is spread from coast to coast in general indignation, corruption, and the national committee has uncovered 'abuses' in Kentucky, Pennsylvania, Illinois, Arkansas and other states."

Dewey, who is unopposed in the April 9 Illinois presidential preference primary, also denounced the Chicago democratic organization from the platform of the big indoor amphitheater in the heart of its home grounds.

"Your new deal Kelly-Nash machine is running a close race with our own mangy tiger down in Tammany hall to see which is the lowest form of political life," he said. "Today the people of Illinois are aroused. There is promise that this year your great state will overthrow the rule of a corrupt political machine."

Viewing the WPA from a national perspective, Dewey stated that during the four months before the 1936 election private employment increased by more than 1,000,000 men but 300,000 were added to WPA roles and the WPA payroll was hiked from \$122,000,000 to \$137,500,000 a month. The month after the vote, he added, 300,000 were dropped.

During the four months preceding the 1938 elections, he said, private industry hired more than 1,000,000 workers but the WPA added 327,000 men to its rolls and the WPA payroll was boosted from \$151,000,000 to \$172,000,000 a month.

"As a reward for the things I have discussed tonight the president elevated Hopkins (former WPA chief) to the cabinet of the United States," Dewey declared, adding:

"Is it any wonder that many a political veteran has been heard to say 'you can't beat five billion dollars.'"

"But you can beat five billion dollars. The American electorate is not for sale. Once they know the shameful corruption that is going on behind the smiling visage of the new deal, they can beat 50 billion dollars."

"This policy of corruption of the ballot is practically the only policy which the administration has consistently followed," the New Yorker declared. "These are the things the next administration will abolish overnight."

Dewey's address was broadcast. He spoke in St. Louis last night and was scheduled to speak in Milwaukee tomorrow night.

Dozenberg Sentenced To 1 Year in Prison

NEW YORK, March 28.—(AP)—William Dozenberg, who for 11 years traveled the world as a spy for the red army of Soviet Russia, was sentenced today to a prison term of a year and a day for misusing the American passports which protected him in that perilous pursuit.

A slight, greying man of 58—as commonplace in appearance as any aging bookkeeper—he stood before the federal bench to hear the judgment of the court.

Then, glancing occasionally at a sheet of paper, he addressed the courtroom, including a silent group of his former comrades in the communist movement.

"I had ideals and convictions, and have lived for them. I have but two aims in life now, however short or long it may be. They are, first, to watch my precious baby daughter grow into womanhood and to contribute my share to it, if given the opportunity. I love my baby and her mother."

Exposures American Ideals
"Second, to take my place in our American society as a patriotic, loyal and law-abiding citizen. I have come to the profound realization, due to the experiences, trials and tribulations I have suffered, that the ideals of American democracy are beyond compare."

He had pleaded guilty several weeks ago to the use of passports obtained through fraudulent statements, had turned government evidence and aided the prosecution in the trial of Earl Browder, the national communist leader who now is under a four-year sentence for a similar offense.

US Attorney John T. Cahill had asked for Dozenberg a sentence of 1½ years, but Defense Attorney Harry D. Mann successfully protested, declaring that such a punishment is excessive in view of his client's services to the government, and telling Judge Samuel Mandelbaum:

Peace Connections Broken
"He has completely broken with his past connections. Having devoted his life to a cause, he now finds himself in the predicament of seeing that cause sour. Cahill told the court that Dozenberg was born in Russia, that his wife was now employed as a nurse in the social security board in Washington, and is the mother of a year-old girl. He recalled that the recanting communist had traveled on passport under the name of Dallant, while Browder himself once had gone abroad as Nicholas Dozenberg, and said that at least back in 1928 Dozenberg had been picked for the intelligence service of the red army."

Dozenberg was arrested by federal agents last fall at Bend, Ore., where he had opened a community grocery store and held a position of respect in the community.

Driver of Death Bus Is Released
PORTLAND, March 28.—(AP)—M. S. Stapp, Portland Traction company driver, was released today by Deputy District Attorney Tom Work pending investigation of yesterday's fatal bus-automobile collision.

Stapp is charged with failure to give right of way to E. B. Ellis, Electrical Products Corporation manager, was killed in the crash, which virtually destroyed his automobile. His son and three bus passengers were injured.

The automobile was crushed against a telephone pole by the passenger coach.

Bend Fugitive Is Held in Portland
PORTLAND, March 28.—(AP)—Ralph Ingwersen, 49, was held at the city jail today as a fugitive from Bend.

State Police Sergeant F. E. Dodelle said Ingwersen, arrested at Scappoose yesterday, escaped from the Bend jail with Cleve Hall, 54, on March 3. Hall still is at liberty.

"It has substituted its judgment for the judgment of congress," he said.

Cox Attacks NLRB Secretary
He directed his fire especially at Nathan Witt, board secretary, saying that Witt "handles" Board Chairman J. Warren Madden and Board Member Edwin S. Smith "as if they were his private jumping jacks."

Rep. Wood (D-Mo) protested that the cuts which were proposed by the house appropriations committee would "hamstring" the administration of the Wagner act.

This brought from Rep. Case (R-SD) the remark that David J. Saposs, the head of the research division, had once written that collectivization and socialism were the "only way out" for the workers.

Slash Will Impede Program, Says Chairman
Chairman Madden told reporters, in response to queries, that the cut, approved by the senate, would "seriously impede" the board's work for the coming fiscal year.

Over the objections of economy forces, the house voted 204 to 176 to add the \$50,000,000 to the \$230,000,000 CCC fund so that the current total of 150 camps could be continued in the next fiscal year.

But, an unnoticed stipulation may hold the additional expenditure down to \$23,000,000 instead of \$50,000,000. The bill provides that unless the president declares an emergency only 10 per cent more than the budget estimates may be spent, and then only with the approval of the federal security administrator.

\$27,450,000 Added To NYA Fund
The members also decided, by a vote of 221 to 157, to tack the \$27,450,000 on to the NYA fund, in order to continue that program substantially as it is being conducted at present.

The bill, in addition to items already mentioned, carried \$421,000,000 for the social security program, \$32,000,000 for the labor department, \$125,000,000 for the railroad retirement board, \$5,000,000 for the employee compensation commission and \$2,843,000 for the national labor relations board.

2nd Red Defies Dies Committee
WASHINGTON, March 28.—(AP)—For the second time in a week, a communist leader flatly defied the Dies committee today. The committee voted to cite him for contempt.

Despite threat of a jail sentence, George Powers, who identified himself as district secretary of the communist party at Pittsburgh, refused to give the committee a list of the party's members, protesting to Chairman Dies (D-Tex) that "they're trying to blacklist our people in industry."

"I will be no party to putting members on a blacklist," he declared. "You got the wrong man here."

The committee then voted to charge him with contempt of the house, an offense punishable by up to a year's imprisonment and \$1,000 fine.

The same action was taken after James H. Dolsen, also a communist leader at Pittsburgh, refused Monday to answer questions.

Piano Salesman Who Can't Play Is Best Producer, Says Manufacturer

SEATTLE, March 28.—(AP)—The nation's piano business is booming and those who know revealed here today that a lot of credit for the upswing should go to the salesman who never sat down to the keyboard.

Last month more than 11,000 pianos were manufactured in the country for the biggest month in 14 years, Lawrence H. Seix, of Chicago, an official of the National Piano Manufacturers' association, said.

Seix, attending a convention of piano dealers of Washington, Oregon and British Columbia, said more than four times as many pianos were sold in the nation last year than during the "big year" of 1933. During the last four months of 1939, he said, manufacturers were unable to meet the demand for pianos.

A recent nation-wide survey shows that apparently the less a piano salesman can play the more pianos he sells, Seix told the convention.

"The piano salesman who plays apparently wants to give a recital more than to sell his instrument. The average run of his repertoire includes such showy numbers as 'When Your Hair Has Turned to Silver.' Prospects don't seem to take that sort of thing any more."

He knows one former concert pianist who, while talking to a customer, never admits he can play, and he's one of the most successful salesmen I know," he said.

Police Seeking Co-ed's Slayer
PENN STATE GIRL'S BODY Found Near School by Janitor

STATE COLLEGE, Pa., March 28.—(AP)—Seeking some definite clue to the identity of a sex-crazed slayer who hammered to death a 17-year-old co-ed, the police are assaulting her state and borough police centered their inquiry tonight upon students at the Pennsylvania state college.

The brown-haired victim, Rachel Hutchinson Taylor, was found this morning by a janitor reporting her work on the Lehigh consolidated school, three miles outside of town. She had arrived on a bus at 1:30 a. m., after an Easter holiday with her parents in Wildwood, N.J.

The almost naked body bore two glaring wounds in the forehead, one almost an inch deep. Dr. Herbert Glenn said they might have been struck by a hammer. There were other wounds on the face, neck, chest and abdomen.

Coroner Charles Schekler reported the girl had been criminally attacked and estimated she died about 2:30 a. m. His jury found she was killed by a "person or persons unknown" using a "blunt or sharp instrument."

Colonel Lynn Adams, commissioner of the state's famed motor police and one of the nation's best criminal experts, personally took charge of the investigation.

First to be called into the investigation headquarters were representatives of some 50 fraternities on the State college campus.

Burgess Wilbur Lettsell pleaded with the students to report immediately "any suspicious persons" and especially "not to shield anyone."

Meanwhile this usually calm community of 11,000, which includes the 6000 students, suddenly became the center of great excitement.

Rumors ran rampant. One was that a "dark-haired" man who had been accosting co-eds was the central suspect and another involved a man in a red coupe.

The man in the coupe was located and furnished an alibi, police said. The burgess added that so far as he knew the report of the dark-haired man was "just another of the wild rumors."

Adams declined to comment.

British Fliers Downed, Holland
ROTTERDAM, March 28.—(AP)—The Netherlands air force lieutenant, jumping out of bed and pulling his flying suit on over his pajamas, roared into the air early today and shot down a twin-engine five-man British bomber which was returning over the heart of Holland from a night flight over Germany.

One member of the British bomber's crew was killed when he jumped from the plane just before the pilot succeeded in landing it, in flames, on the "inland island" of IJsselmonde, just south of this busy port. The British pilot was burned about the face and another member of the crew was wounded slightly in the hip by a machinegun bullet. A boy, cycling on a dyke, was shot in the arm.

The Dutch flier who shot down the bomber was Lieut. P. Noomen, a former KLM airlines pilot. The British bomber did not fire at him or at the other Dutch fighting plane which chased the bomber for fifteen minutes through the clouds; they merely tried to get away and ignored Noomen's signals telling them to land.

Stadelman, The Dalles, for the republican nomination for state senator from Wasco and Hood River counties yesterday confirmed reports that he had given up the idea of running for state treasurer. Leslie M. Scott, Portland, former highway commission chairman, has not announced whether or not he will oppose Cook and Hill for this post.

She'll Not Ask Re-election
Mildred Robertson Brooks, Marion county recorder for 25 years, yesterday made official reports that she would not seek re-election. Mrs. Chester M. Cox has already filed for the republican nomination for this office.

"I have held the office long enough," Mrs. Brooks said yesterday. "I have held it for 25 years. I have asked the people for it during that period and they willingly gave it to me. Marion county as a whole has been exceedingly kind and non-critical during this long period and I feel a deep sense of appreciation not only for the office, but for the kindly way in which I have been treated."

Neal Speaks for Better Labor Conditions
"If I nominated and elected . . . I will in an honest, efficient and cooperative manner assist as a member of the county court in the management of all county business for the people of Marion county, so far as the law and duties of county judge will permit in my social ambition."

Neal's ballot statement read, "I shall encourage education and future developments for the children, better conditions for labor

and business and old age security for the old people. I am a farmer and grange member."

If and when Neel gives up the county democratic chairmanship, which he has held since 1938, Ruth Norris of Salem, vice-chairman, will succeed him to serve until a new chairman is elected.

dent of the Anglo-California National bank in October, 1938.

Looking pale and somewhat nervous, he told newsmen he had "nothing whatever to add" to the statement issued by his attorney, which said in effect the banker had done only what he felt entitled to do.

The indictment charged in substance that Fleishacker, on October 22, 1937, withdrew without authorization \$55,100 from the account of the Pacific Mail Steamship Co. in his bank, that he converted the sum into cash, that he used it himself.

The various counts of the indictment enumerate checks totaling \$53,231. Assistant US Attorney A. J. Zirpoli said some of the smaller ones, which would have made up the total, were omitted for brevity in the indictment.

The indictment charged that one check for \$5000 was endorsed by Fleishacker and delivered by him to Paul Shoup, former president of the Southern Pacific company, and a stockholder in the Pacific Mail company. The check later was paid by the bank, the indictment said.

The office of US Attorney Frank Hennessy said it is clear that Shoup was not involved in the alleged misapplication of funds, and the withdrawal was made by Fleishacker alone.

PORTLAND BANKS' Gains Are Steady
PORTLAND, March 28.—(AP)—Portland banks have gained almost continuously since the 1933 holiday, they reported today.
Seven banks' deposits totaled \$289,756,647 on March 26, compared with \$281,070,897 on December 31.

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
