led without inflicting damage on the ships. One German plane was lost.

Scant Immediate Peace Hope, Stated

Before asked about the Berlin documents, Mr. Roosevelt had told newsmen that there was scant immediate prospect for any end of the war in Europe. He has had two talks with his European fact-finder, Sumner Welles, and his formal statement was his first on the subject of the Welles visit since the undersecretary of state returned to this country.

The president's statement and Mr. Hull's were followed within a few hours by denials from Bullitt and the Polish ambassador to Washington, Count Jerzy Potocki, that statements in the documents made public in Berlin.

Referring to President Roosevelt's statement, Bullitt declared: "This particular piece of propaganda should be taken with even more salt. I never have made anyone the statements attributed to me."

Said Potocki: "I deny the allegations attributed to my reports. I never had any conversations with Ambassador Bullitt on America's participation in the war."

Allies Are Warned of Near East Peril

Rounding out the day's top developments, Russia's premier, Vyacheslav Molotov, proclaimed his country's desire to "maintain our neutrality and refrain from any participation in the war" in Europe.

However, Molotov warned the allies that they are "playing with fire" with their armies in the near East. His speech to the joint session of the two houses of the supreme soviet was extremely critical of Britain and France and contained some threats at the United States.

An authorized German spokesman said the Berlin documents, which with one exception were in typewritten form, are of the greatest importance in "throwing an interesting light on the part which American policy played in bringing about the present war."

German newspapers subsequently were more forthright in their criticism of Bullitt and Ambassador Joseph P. Kennedy, also quoted in the documents.

One paper labelled as confidential reports by Count Jerzy Potocki, Polish ambassador in Washington, and dated Nov. 21, 1938, quoted Bullitt as saying that the United States, France and Britain must "arm up tremendously in order to defy German power."

It added that Bullitt said the United States "undoubtedly" would take part in the then coming war "but only after England and France bestirred themselves first."

Eventual American Help Is Promised

On January 16, 1939, the documents said, Potocki cabled Poland's foreign minister, Josef Beck, that the United States, in the eyes of Bullitt, would place itself with all behind France and England against the totalitarian states.

After Bullitt returned to Paris the Polish ambassador there, Jules Lukasiewicz, in a "strictly secret" note to Beck dated February, 1939, allegedly quoted Bullitt as saying that "should war break out, we certainly will not participate at the beginning, but we shall finish it."

In the war itself, relations between Britain and Soviet Russia became more shaky. The British handed over to their French ally two confiscated soviet freighters and made preparations to round up German ships reported loading for an attempted dash from the Netherlands East Indies to Vladivostok.

The French reported increased aerial fighting on the western front.

Pittman Change Barely Defeated

Only Three-Vote Majority Averts Requirement of Ratification

WASHINGTON, March 29.—(AP)—A three-vote majority in the senate today saved the Roosevelt trade pact program from an amendment which, administration spokesmen leaders had said, would "nullify" the efforts to lower trade barriers by agreements with foreign nations.

By a vote of 44 to 41, the chamber rejected an amendment by Senator Pittman (D. Nev.) requiring that a future reciprocal trade pact be submitted to the senate for ratification by a two-thirds vote.

The defeat of his amendment cleared the way for action next week upon the pending legislation authorizing a three-year continuation of the present trade agreements act, under which the administration can reduce tariff as much as 50 per cent in return for concessions from other nations. The agreements embodying these mutual concessions are not subject to Senate action.

Today's vote encouraged administration forces to believe the continuation bill would go through without difficulty.

The decision on the Pittman resolution was taken amid scarcely concealed excitement. After a week of cloakroom maneuvering all had known for days the vote would be close—a hushed senate answered the call of the roll at 4 o'clock, a voting hour previously agreed upon.

About 8:30 o'clock a succession of brilliant colored waves fanned across cloudy skies, originating on the northeast horizon. Witnesses said the clouds became luminous and stars were visible through them.

Personnel Setup Is Revised Again

PORTLAND, March 29.—(AP)—A reluctant state public welfare commission, pressed by the social security board to accept its personnel administration plan, voted today to submit another modified version.

The commission wants a one-year residence clause for all job applicants and exemptions for five major department heads.

Other employees still have no idea what kind of questions the board will ask in an examination next December, Chairman Jack Lulihn said.

A sub-committee was authorized to join Multnomah county officials in details of increasing the food stamp plan's revolving fund from \$55,000 to \$75,000 or \$85,000 to overcome "freezing" of receipts during transmission to the state treasurer's office and back.

Four counties may inaugurate the stamp plan if county courts approve. The following revolving funds would be set up: Clackamas \$25,000; Marion \$35,000; Lane \$20,000 and Linn \$75,000.
