CCC Camp Has Open House for Observance of 7th Anniversary

SUBMITTY—Seventh anniversary of the establishing of CCC camps in the United States was observed with an all day open house Sunday at Camp Mill City. Hundreds of visitors were conducted through the camp and shown exhibits prepared by the 126 enrollees.

Chief host was Captain Moxley L. Beck, who recently assumed command of the camp. A reserve officer of the 35th coast artillery brigade. Captain Beck came here from Glenwood, Alabama. Enrollees come from Georgia, Mississippi, Alabama, Tennessee, North Carolina and Florida. Seventy three more boys will arrive from Tennessee in a few days, it is expected.

An honor guest for the day was E. P. Roberts, general superintendent of state camps, with headquarters in Salem.

The aims of citizenship and employability were emphasized in exhibits and explanations of the work throughout the day. School work included classes from the first grade through all years in high school which meet from 8 to 9 o'clock five nights a week. Since July, 1933, 48 boys have completed the camp course from the first grade at the camp.

The library contains more than 2000 volumes, including text books for class work and fiction books. High school correspondence courses are serviced by the California state department of education providing 33 courses. Class courses are planned in units of three months.

Staff officers besides Captain Beck include A. G. Ogren, camp adviser and supervisor of academic classes; Dr. H. D. Johnston, camp surgeon; T. D. Pomeroy, project superintendent. Pomeroy's assistants include Anton F. Fisher, senior foreman; Wendell Ewing, squad foreman; Ray A. McCoy, Harry Ingraham, Penny Cooper and James E. Barto are junior foremen; Roscoe Q. Meeker, Clarence J. Judd and Hans R. Wittenburg, foremen; John L. Ray, blacksmith, and Herbert Giller, camp mechanic.

Last Rites Said For 92-Year-old

JEFFERSON—Funeral services for John August Aupperle, 92, who died early Friday morning at the home of his son, Guy Aupperle, were held at 1:30 o'clock Monday afternoon from the Jefferson Christian church. Concluding services were held at the Portland crematorium.

Aupperle, son of Gottlieb and Elizabeth Hartman Aupperle, was born in Huntingdon county, Pennsylvania, November 30, 1847. He moved to Grant county, Wisconsin, where he was married to Melissa Potter October 25, 1883. To this union three sons were born, Earl E., and Hugh; both deceased; and Guy M. Aupperle of Jefferson. Mrs. Aupperle died March 23, 1933. Later Mr. Aupperle was married to Rebecca Jackson and in 1901 they came to Jefferson. Mrs. Aupperle died a few years later.

Aupperle operated the flour and grist mill here, and also became president of the Oregon State bank. Since retiring from business, he has made his home with his son, Guy M. Aupperle, near Green's bridge.

Other survivors are a granddaughter, Elizabeth Aupperle of Centralia, Wash.; grandson, John Aupperle of Sacramento, Calif.; and a brother, D. W. Aupperle, of Grand Junction, Colo.

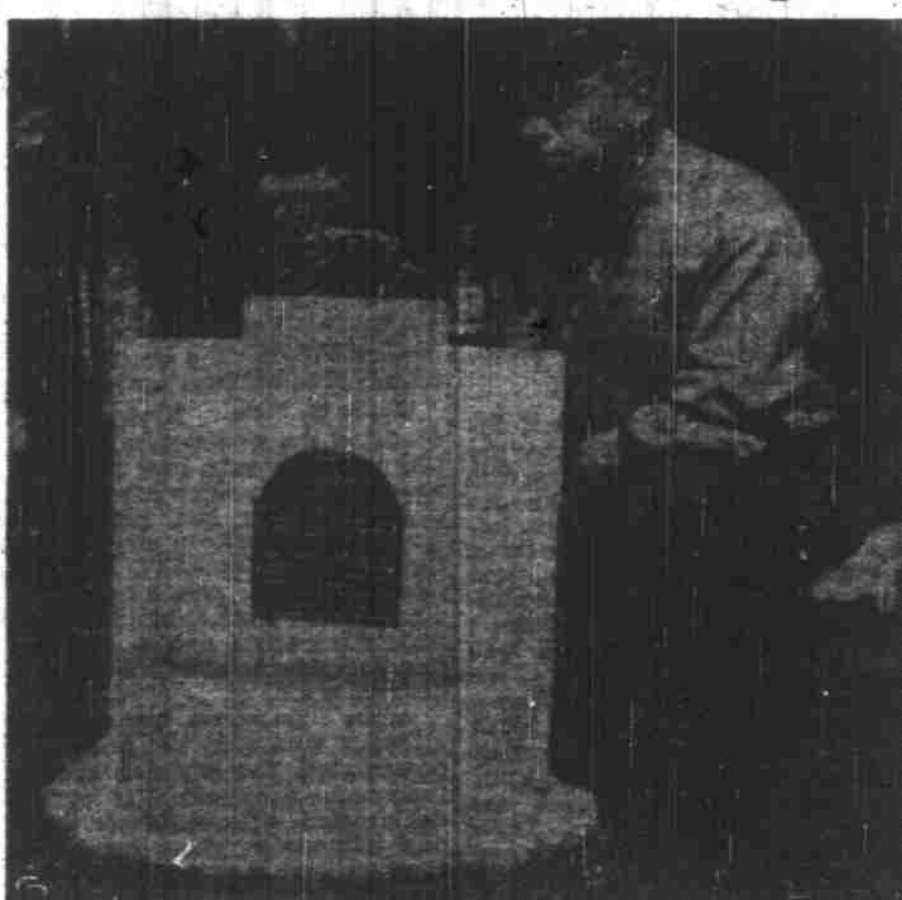

Big Wind Plays Havoc Over Wide Valley Area

JEFFERSON—The strong southwest wind which swept over the valley Friday did some damage here. The large plate glass window on the south side of Thurston's store was blown in. Signs were blown down at the stage terminal. A large cherry tree was damaged in the yard of Mrs. H. C. Epley. Shingles and roofing were torn off of buildings by the gusts of wind. The city was practically deprived of electric service for 12 hours. The moving picture show had to close, after showing about one-third of the picture.

Because of disruption in electric service, turkey growers in this section were much concerned, having their hatcheries filled with turkey eggs.

Sheep Trapped SUVER—Friday night's high wind did widespread damage to buildings, trees and shrubs in this district. A large stock shed on the E. G. Harris farm was blown down, trapping 15 sheep and killing several. A large cherry tree at the Lloyd Goodman farm was split in two. At the farm of the Vanderpools a large section of the chicken house roof was carried away.

Electric power was cut off from 3 p.m. until 9 p.m. The south wall of the granary at the H. F. Coven farm was blown in. A large tree fell across the highway at the turn near Falks, and in numerous places the road was almost blocked by brush and trees blown out of root.

Tree Hits Barn HAZEL GREEN—In the Lash garden section many trees were blown down by Friday's high wind. A very large tree trunk just missed hitting the Combs home. The limbs damaged the house.
