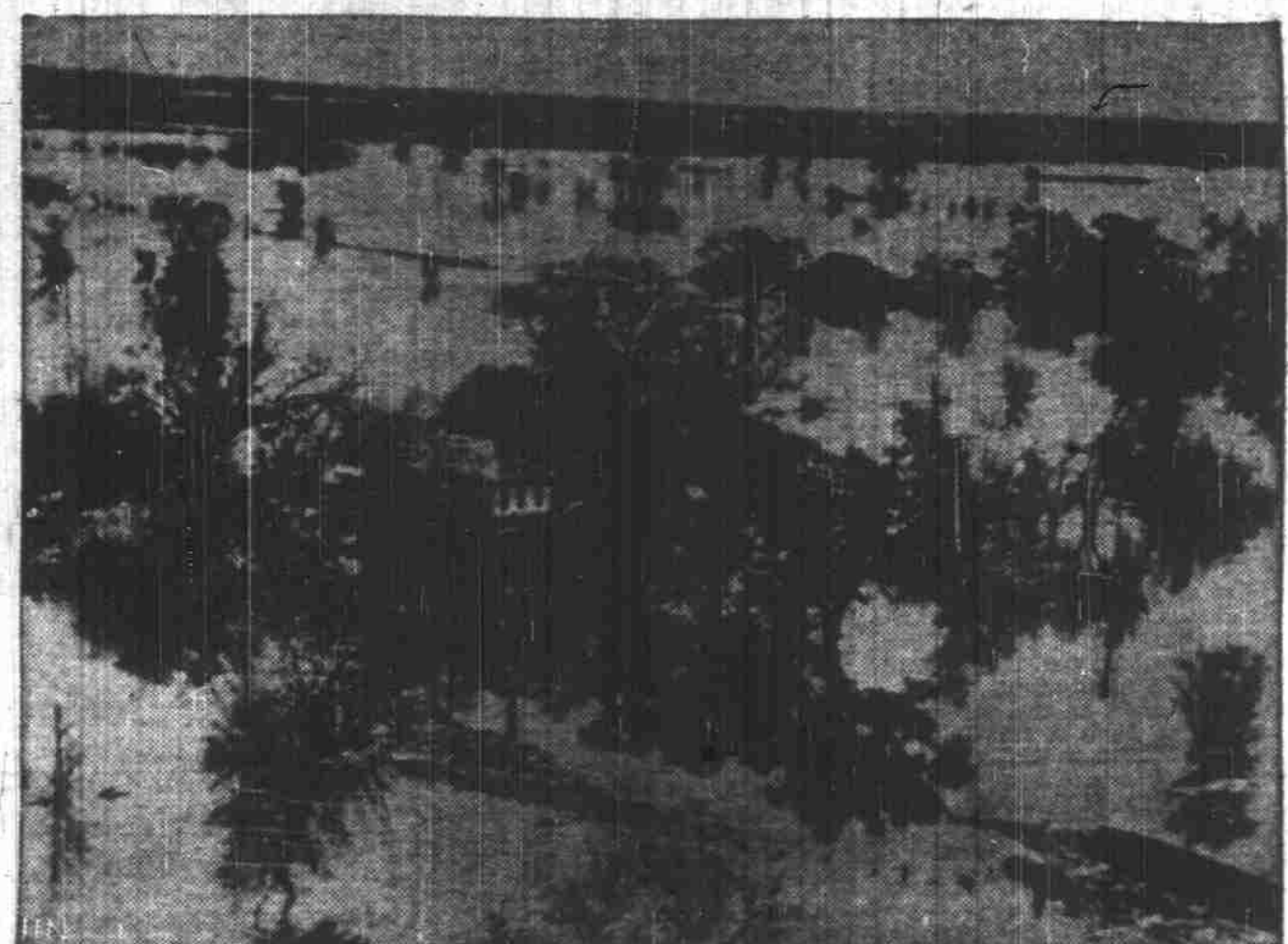
Club at Waconda Has all-Day Meet

Firemen Will Give Program

Aumsville Is Commending
Chief on Protective
Equipment Added

AUMSVILLE—The Aumsville firemen are completing plans for the annual program to be given in the school gymnasium Friday night, April 13. A play will be the principal feature of the program.

S. J. Welas, fire chief and his corps of assistants are being congratulated on their having sponsored the installation of adequate fire protection for this community, including a fire truck, hundreds of feet of hose and enough volunteer firemen to handle emergencies effectively and speedily. The firemen have been assisted by donations from patrons and by giving benefit card parties, dances, and skating parties, which have been well patronized by the public.

In order to make the fire protection for the Aumsville community more adequate, the firemen were desirous of obtaining an automatic alarm signal. But the purchase price seemed prohibitive. Robert Mountain volunteered to make an alarm that would enable the telephone operator to sound the fire siren. After several weeks of experimentation at his home, using the telephone and electric washing machine as experimental apparatus, he constructed an automatic signal which has been installed by the Aumsville fire department.

Duvall Charges 2-Sided Policy

Advocates Concentrating
on South American
Trade Extension

SILVERTON—That the United States sells democracy on one side and bullets to blow up democracy on the other, was the statement of Dr. John Duvall Wednesday night in speaking at the adult forum at Silverton.

"We feel so sorry for the Chinese that we send all our scrap iron to Japan to help fight the war. We feel so sorry for Finland that we send supplies to Russia," Dr. Duvall advocated concentrating on trade with South America, rather than interfere with Europe.

"The World War number two has dropped the trade plum right into the United States' economic lap and we had better cultivate this than try to make a down payment on the European war by extending the warring countries credit."

But to develop the trade with South America, Dr. Duvall said "we might have to forget our lumber and our wheat in terms of individualism and study reciprocal trade. They have a policy down there that reads something like 'buy from those who buy from us.'"

Dr. Duvall was of the opinion that to maintain trade without war, eventually a such country would have to produce that group of commodities which it was best suited to produce.

This was announced as the last forum for the season. The forums, begun late in autumn, have proved very popular here, sponsors report. Credit for beginning the forums at Silverton is given to Herman Kramer, principal of the senior high school, who introduced the speaker Wednesday night. Various civic groups in the city have sponsored the financial end of the forum.
