Horse From Across Tracks Defeats Field Before 125,000 Witnesses

AINTREE, Eng., April 5.—(AP)—On flying feet whose running rhythm defeated favorites and tortuous turf, Bogskar, "a horse from across the railroad tracks" captured the 102nd grand national steeplechase today before 125,000 spectators.

A rank outsider at odds that shifted from 33 to 1 to 25 to 1 in the last half-hour, ridden by Sgt. Marvin Michael Jones, royal air force pilot on leave, and jumped hard twice, the little known seven-year-old owned and trained by Lord Stalbridge soundly whipped 29 other jumpers, two of them American-owned.

Carrying 144 pounds, this Merriwell of horses not only slammed down the stretch to kick L. Scott Briggs, highly regarded MacMoffatt, by four lengths but came within one-fifth of a second of equalling the record of nine minutes, 20 2/5 seconds set by Dorothy Page's Golden Miller in 1934.

The triumph brought \$20,000 to Bogskar's owner, chickenfaced compared with the thousands won by holders of lucky tickets in the Irish hospital sweepstakes, MacMoffatt, held at 8 to 1, and runner-up for the second straight year, got \$2,000. J. R. Nellis' Gold Arrow, priced at 60 to 1, and six lengths back of MacMoffatt in third place, won \$300.

Demaret, Mangrum Are out in Front; Bud Ward Has Best Round of Day

AUGUSTA, Ga., April 5.—(AP)—The man who cuts the pins decided there'd be no more 64's shot at the Augusta National Golf club today. As a result there was only one round shown 70 in the second 18 holes of the masters' tournament, and the two Texans who tied for the 36-hole head got there by shooting no better than average golf.

One was Jimmy Demaret, the smiling kid from Houston who added a 72 to his opening 67 for 137. The other was Lloyd Mangrum, who was born in Texas but works in Oak Park, Ill.

Besides the Texans and the pin-cutter, the day's outstanding performer undoubtedly was Marvin "Bud" Ward of Spokane, The US amateur champion, who takes great pride in being able to meet the pros at their own game, medal play, shot a four-under-par 68 that none of them could touch. This game him a 142 for a fourth-place tie with Henry Picard.

Lloyd gave one of the best demonstrations of the ancient and honorable game's ups and downs by going up on the record-breaking 67 he shot yesterday to a 75 that was three over par for this beautiful golf course, but a respectable round under the circumstances.

This was, in fact, a great day for the Texans and an even better day for the man who cut the pins. By contributing not only the co-leaders, but also the next man to them—Open Champion Byron Nelson who, as Demaret's partner for the afternoon, had another 72 and thereby achieved a 141 total.
