est of preserving civil liberties" he would introduce such a bill Monday.

Lists of Members Would Be Required

Dies said he thought any such measure should require international connections to be listed of their members with some government agency.

Voorhis' proposed bill, however, would merely authorize the secretary of state to impose such a requirement. The Californian said he had had such legislation in mind for several months and was not motivated solely by the committee's present court battles with communists.

Dies said he was not "uneasy about the charges filed by Carl Reeve, communist leader, whose office was raided."

The seizure of communist records in Philadelphia, he declared was "perfectly legal."

Voorhis' bill would supplement the present law requiring agents of foreign principals to register with the state department. It would apply:

1. Any organization which limits its membership to the citizens of a particular foreign country or group of countries.

2. Any organization receiving contributions or any financial aid from any foreign government.

3. Any group whose policies are determined by "or in collaboration with" any foreign government or any officer or citizen of any foreign state.

4. Any organization the purpose of which is to aid or further the cause of a foreign government or a political group in a foreign country.

Such groups would be required to disclose their headquarters, names and addresses of their officials, qualifications for membership, aims and purposes of the organization, source of income and to file copies of their charters and publications.

The secretary of state also could require them to file "such other information" as he determined, including membership lists.

Organizations failing to file statements would be subject to a fine of \$10,000. Any organization official who filed a false statement would be liable to two years imprisonment and a fine of \$10,000.

Finsley Speaker At Parole Meet

PULLMAN, Wash., April 6.—(P)—Long prison terms and supervision of all convicts by the state for several years after parole were urged today by Fred Finsley, Oregon state director of parole and probation, in an address at the closing session of the Pacific northwest law enforcement conference.

The three-day conference, attended by 100 officers, was sponsored by Washington State college.

"Most of the 'repeaters' are short-termers and if long maximum sentences were set these men would be careful about violating the parole which would return them to prison to serve out the full term," said Finsley.

Mystery Vessels Will Load Wheat

PORTLAND, Ore., April 6.—(P)—Conjecture buzzed in Columbia river shipping circles today on the identity of two ships due here soon to load two of four wheat cargoes reported sold to Russia but undelivered.

The American motorship Cleveland was expected Sunday to load one cargo and the Panamanian motorship Aurora was due late in the month to take a second.

Both will go to Vladivostok. The Merchants' Exchange said two reports had been heard regarding the other ships—one that a Russian vessel en route here had turned back in mid-Pacific upon learning of seizure by British warships of two other Russian vessels laden with possible war supplies. The other report said Amtorg was seeking ships of neutral nationality to pick up the grain.

Woman Killed by Accidental Shot

ONTARIO, Ore., April 6.—(P)—Sheriff Charles Glenn said today Mrs. Maud Hudson, 40, was fatally injured when she was accidentally shot by her husband, C. B. Hudson.

Hudson was cleaning a deer rifle in their farm home in the Oregon Slope district nine miles from here when the weapon discharged, said Glenn, who was summoned to investigate.

The charge entered her left side and Mrs. Hudson died within an hour.

Glenn said Earl Carter, friend of the Hudsons, was a witness to the accidental shooting.

Census Taker Is Jailed by Error

Gets in but Has Trouble Getting out; Another Finds Dead Man

OLYMPIA, April 6.—(P)—All this would not have happened had not Patrolman James Hearn gone to lunch—leaving a census taker in a city jail asking questions.

Probably because he was in a hurry to get home to lunch, Patrolman Hearn forgot to tell the relief man all about it.

Result—well, when the census taker called through the barred door that "I'm ready to go now"—the relief officer just laughed.

He's heard numerous gags used by inmates seeking their freedom but this explanation was a new one. Finally, however, he investigated—and found the man had told the truth.

HOQUIAM, April 6.—(P)—Mrs. Elva Horn, census taker for Tumacum and vicinity, 20 miles northwest of here, found Bachelor John Bergreen dead in his cabin in the sparsely settled Promised Land country.

The man had been dead two or three days it was believed and died of natural causes.

One enumerator thought Bergreen should be included in the 1940 census as he probably had been alive April 1 although unable to answer necessary questions.

Catholic Leaders Hold Conference

PORTLAND, Ore., April 6.—(P)—Catholic leaders of four states gathered here today for a three-day regional conference of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine.

The confraternity sponsors religious vacation schools on a world-wide basis. Attending the conference are eight bishops, numerous monsignori, several hundred priests and almost 1000 nuns from Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana.

National Director Father Stephen A. Leven, Tonkawa, Okla., arrived today.

A pontifical high mass at Cathedral of Immaculate Conception was held this morning. Bishop Charles D. White, Spokane, who preached the sermon said the conference was "to inspire and direct all of us in the great work of making our Lord known and loved by those who know and love him not."

Relief Increases Virtually Certain

WASHINGTON, April 6.—(P)—Economy advocates in congress virtually resigned themselves today to an increase in next year's relief fund beyond President Roosevelt's budget estimate of \$985,000,000.

Senator Adams (D-Colo.), chairman of the subcommittee which will handle the relief appropriation bill, expressed belief the budget estimate would have to be increased but said he did not think the total outlay would exceed \$1,300,000,000.

On the house side, Rep. Cannon (D-Mo.), appropriations committee member, remarked cryptically "we are going to take care of the needs."

It was indicated that administration leaders expected some definite expression from the White House.

Influential house members asserted privately that they understood "serious consideration" was being given by the president to the question of transmitting a request for additional money for the WPA.

Cyclone Strikes Louisiana Town; One Known Dead

INDEPENDENCE, La., April 7.—(Sunday)—(P)—City Marshal Joe Alessi said that a large part of the town of Amite, six miles away, had been "completely torn up" by a cyclone that struck there early today, and that at least one person was dead and "plenty of" others not got out yet from under the buildings.

P. L. Clifford, lead dispatcher at the Mississippi Power and Light company substation at Jackson, Miss., said he had reports from power company workers at Amite that the "entire middle section of Amite was wiped out." The storm struck at 12:19 a.m. (CST), he added.

The fire company at Independence, six miles from Amite, was called out and sent to the stricken city. The Independence hospital said no injured had been received there, however.

Aviatrix Claims New Speed Mark

BURBANK, Calif., April 6.—(P)—Jacqueline Cochran, pretty aviatrix, traveled 3000 kilometers today at a speed of approximately 324 miles per hour and claimed a new world's record for the distance.

She left Union air terminal here at 8:33 a.m. (PST), rounded a pylon 30 miles west of Albuquerque, N.M., and crossed the finish line at 12:33:47. Her elapsed time was 3 hours, 44 minutes, 47 seconds.

Suspect in Wreck Case Is Arrested

PORTLAND, April 6.—(P)—Detective Harry Goitz tonight arrested a transient whose description fitted that of Albert Fry, wanted in the wrecking August 13 of the Southern Pacific's streamliner "City of San Francisco."

The man gave his name as Jack Burns. Goitz said he was charged with vagrancy and ordered held for railroad authorities.

Dr. Sturgeon new Head of Surgeons

PORTLAND, Ore., April 5.—(P)—Dr. Charles T. Sturgeon of Los Angeles became president of the Pacific Coast Surgical association Friday, as the 15th annual convention held its election.

Dr. Homer Dudley, Seattle, was elected first vice-president; Dr. William K. Livingston, Portland, second vice-president; Dr. H. Glenn Bell, San Francisco, re-elected secretary-treasurer.

Dr. Edward L. Gilcrease of San Francisco counseled the association to discourage automobile driving among persons who have had a paralytic stroke, who are tired, angry, even slightly under the influence of liquor and who become too rapt in automobile radio.

McReynolds Will Open Restaurant

Opening today of a new restaurant and a lunch room featuring light lunches and soft drinks on the corner of Capitol and Union streets, was announced yesterday by Billy McReynolds, sole proprietor.

Known as "McReynolds," the new establishment has been recently redecorated and repainted in blue and cream shades. All new counter, table and fountain equipment has been newly installed.

McReynolds, a member of last year's graduating class at Willamette university and a graduate of Salem high school, has had previous restaurant experience though this is his first venture as proprietor.

Rains May Spoil View of Eclipse

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., April 6.—(P)—Clouds and rain tomorrow may spoil the show of a generation—a rare ring eclipse of the sun for millions of spectators but astronomers are prepared to fly miles into the air to photograph the event.

Forecasters dashed hopes of amateur and professional observers in the United States when they said bad weather would prevail over most of the narrow line in which the fiery ring would be visible.

"A very little cloudiness could spoil it—if at the wrong time or the wrong place," said Prof. William H. Barton, executive curator of the Hayden planetarium, who brought a delegation here from New York to get the first photographs ever taken of this type of eclipse.

"It is the greatest gamble in science," he declared.

Widow Is Accused In Mystery Death

POCATELLO, Idaho, April 6.—(P)—Mrs. Francis Hardy, 54, was arrested today, charged with killing her husband, Charles E. Hardy, 59, whose death from a gunshot wound last Tuesday was first recorded as suicide.

The arrest came shortly after a coroner's jury had decided that Hardy came to his death "at the hands of a person or persons unknown."

Police Chief Robert M. Pugnaire signed the complaint charging Mrs. Hardy with first degree murder.

Hardy, secretary of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, was eligible for retirement in August.

The shooting occurred about 5 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, shortly after Hardy returned home from work. Neighbors found him with a bullet wound in his chest and called an ambulance, but the man died shortly after he reached the hospital.

Chloe said she herself was struck by her mother at one point during the gory attacks.

Her story led Capt. Edgar Edwards, police homicide chief, to announce earlier that he was prepared to accuse her of all the killings. But today he commented:

"We believe she is telling the truth. We will turn all the facts over to the juvenile court. It remains for the court to determine what steps will be taken."

2 Million Trees Will Be Planted

PORTLAND, April 5.—(P)—Plans for planting 2,000,000 trees in Oregon and Washington this spring were announced by Assistant Regional Forester O. P. Erickson.

The forest service will set out the two and three-year-old trees from its Wind River, Wash., nursery. Four-fifths of the planting will be in the Douglas fir belt, the remainder in the ponderosa pine country east of the Cascade mountains.

State Flying Law Will Be Defended

PORTLAND, Ore., April 6.—(P)—A fight to preserve Oregon's aviation law permitting amateur aircraft building and pilot licensing, was announced today after two amateurs were notified of \$1000 fines imposed by the federal civil aeronautics authority.

Harold Wagner and Donald C. Wray, both Portland, were fined on federal charges of flying "un-certificated" aircraft. Their ships were state-licensed. The federal air authority said the men would have 30 days to offer compromise payments of \$100 each; otherwise the \$1000 fines would stand.

Charles Bernard, operator of an airport at Beaverton which is home field for 30 amateur-built ships, said Wagner and Wray would seek a test case on the state's right to license such aircraft.

PEP Stockholders For Consolidation

PORTLAND, April 6.—(P)—Preferred stockholders claimed today no satisfactory reorganization of the Portland Electric company could be effected without inclusion of two subsidiaries—the Portland General Electric and the Portland Traction companies.

They filed a petition in federal court for re-transfer of all Portland General Electric and Portland Traction company stock now held by the Guaranty Trust company of New York.

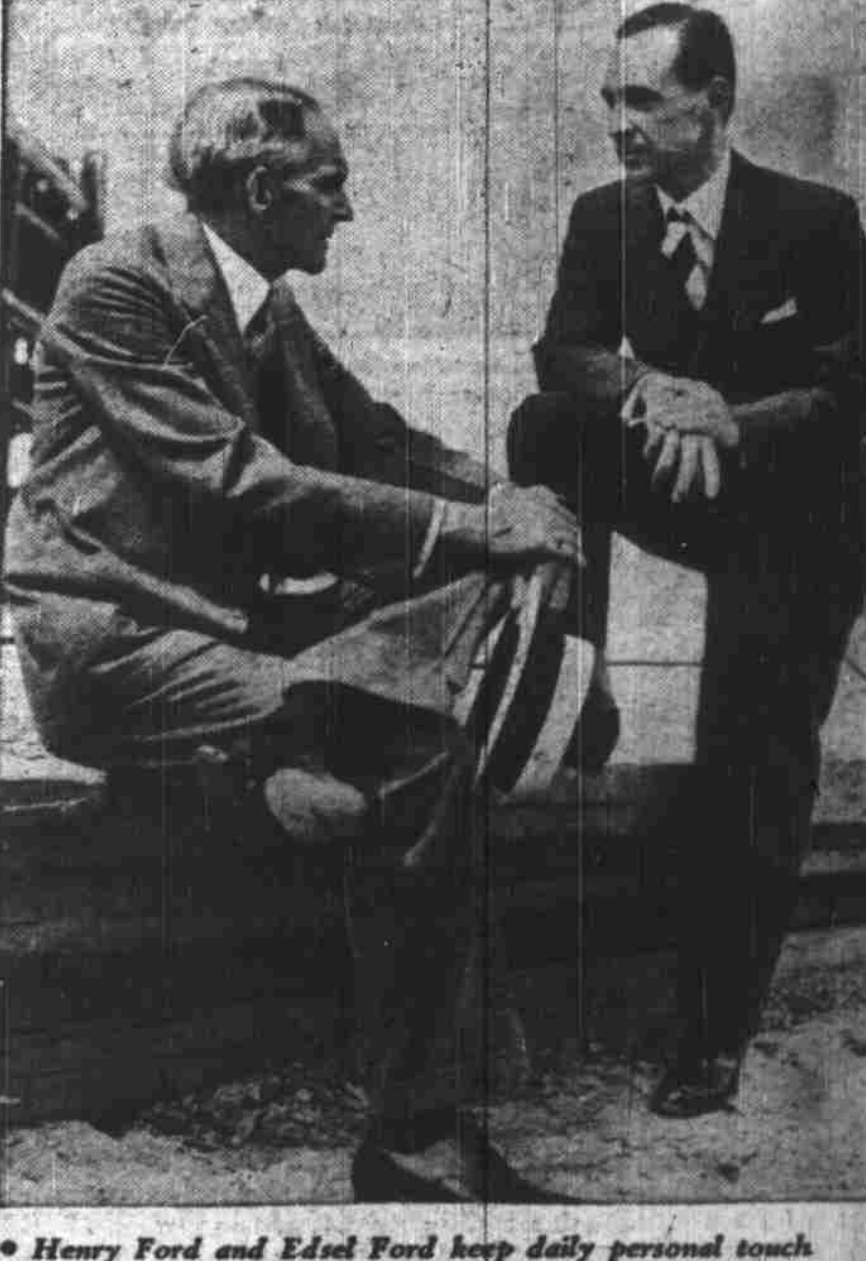
