Mayor Explains Sewer Difficulty

SILVERTON—A little patience instead of quick so many complaints, will help more in speeding up the WPA sewer project at Silverton, in the opinion of Mayor Zetta Schlador. Mayor Schlador reports that many complaints are being made to the effect that the WPA workers are not filling ditches, removing rocks and so forth, where they are putting in new lines.

The mayor explains that in most cases where turf has been removed from parking lots, it has been put on a vacant lot and will later be replaced to its proper location. But the water department, who is sponsoring the project, is desirous of keeping the sponsor's expense down and consequently is making the equipment at this time. But, Mayor Schlador promises, before the project is entirely completed, the men will remove rocks and soil debris, fill and level ditches and replace turf.

Farmers Construct Own Water System

SILVERTON—HILLS—Considerable ingenuity and even more physical labor have furnished two farmer families of the strawberry district with their own water systems, at very little cost.

The two homes are on 80 acres of the old Brady Davis farm. The two enterprising men are Hillman Lovell and John Van Gorder. They found that by digging up the pipe themselves, they could purchase it for what they termed "next to nothing." The pipe was a portion of that which brought water to the bridge creek tank in that lumber camp's prime.

The three-inch pipe was nosed down from the spring to three-fourths inch pipe at the houses. The three-fourths of a mile from spring to homes furnishes an 80-foot fall for the gravity system. There is, they say, plenty of water available for the house, barns and a strawberry acreage. Two additional families may "hook up" before long.
