

Lebanon Paper Mill Starts Experiment in Pulp Drying

Expect Foreign Pulp Shortage

Disturbance of Trade After Norway's Invasion Seen

LEBANON—Monday an experiment was begun in the Crown-Williamette paper mill in Lebanon under the supervision of Paul Middlebrook, superintendent of the mill, in machine drying of the surplus sulphite pulp.

The invasion of Norway with its resultant disturbance of trade, will, it is thought, create a shortage of pulp and in anticipation of this, the experiment is being tried. No new equipment is being installed as the regular paper machines will be used to dry the pulp.

Though a greater demand for domestic pulp, dried so that it is easier to handle and lighter to ship, is anticipated, no orders have been received and this work is experimental.

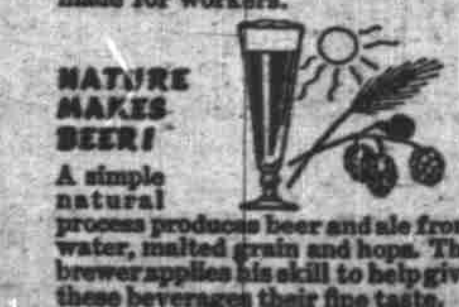
