Fletcher Says Provisions of Wheeler-Jones Bill not Understood

Belief that farmers are not fully apprised of the Wheeler-Jones farm credit bill's provisions was expressed by George A. Fletcher of the Commerce Mortgage company in a talk analyzing the bill and its probable effects, Friday noon at the Salem Realty board luncheon.

The 3 per cent interest feature will attract farmers-and force private lenders out of the farm loan field-but it marks the first direct invasion of the credit business by government, Fletch-Bible study Senday night at 7:30 in the Fraternal temple, 447 Center street. er said. In addition, he predicted that it would be extremely costly to the taxpayers.
