Marsh Absent, Trial Unsettled—Inability of Francis E. Marsh, special prosecutor in the case of state vs. W. Y. Richardson, to be in Salem yesterday or Thursday as he had earlier indicated has meant continued postponement of date-setting for the Richardson trial. The defendant, one-time deputy to former County Treasurer David G. Drager, is charged with larceny of \$10,000 in bonds and is scheduled to stand trial as soon as time may be agreed upon between the court and opposing attorneys. Grand Jury's Report Is Due

Major Matters May Not Be Touched Upon Today, Is Indication

Expectation that the Marion county grand jury will report this morning on certain matters which it has had under consideration was expressed last night by District Attorney Lyle J. Page. The county investigating body, which has held daily sessions at the courthouse since last Tuesday, and has met on a number of previous occasions since its last report several weeks ago, is thought to have had the "human skin" case under investigation as well as affairs in the state forester's office during the administration of former Forester J. W. Ferguson.

It was thought, however, that the report today would deal mainly with routine matters, and probably not with the forestry case of that in which two Salem youths are charged with unlawful use of the remains of a deceased person.

David Bates of Judging Committee Says Many Questions Asked

Many entries have already been received by the poster contest committee of the Salem Centennial, according to Clarence Bates, director of the Salem Art Center and chairman of the committee. Rules for the contest are simple, and for the best posters a total of \$50 will be awarded. First prize has been set at \$25; second, \$15 and third, \$10; with a special \$15 prize for posters submitted by children under 18 years of age. All posters must bear the centennial slogan, "From Wilderness to Wonderland," and the dates of the celebration, July 31, August 2-4. Each poster must have attached to the back an envelope containing the name and address of the contestant. Posters should be worked in flat colors on cardboard, 11 by 17 inches and suitable for vertical mount. Deadline for the contest is 5:30 p. m. of May 18. Church Plans New Precedent

Presbyterians to Install Religious Education Director

Establishing a precedent, the presbytery of Willamette, will officially install Rev. Oscar W. Payne as director of religious education of the First Presbyterian church of Salem, Monday night, at 8 p. m. in the church sanctuary.

This is the first time in its history that a director of religious education has been officially installed by the Willamette presbytery.

Dr. E. W. Warrington of Oregon State college, Corvallis, will preach the sermon. Dr. W. B. Mahon, pastor of the Presbyterian church of Mill City, and stated clerk of the synod of Oregon will bring the charge to the director of religious education. From Mill City will come Dr. James Aiken Smith, who will bring the charge to the people. Dr. A. M. Williams of Nelscott, moderator of the presbytery will preside and pronounce the constitutional questions. There will be special music provided by George Lee Marks.

The installation will be preceded by church night, which will begin with the usual covered-dish dinner in the social hall at 6:30 p. m. Guests at the church night dinner will be 11 girls who attended the older girls' conference at McMinnville. A delegation of these girls will bring brief reports of the convention. Other guests include the installing pastors, and members of the Presbyterian basketball teams, one of which won the season title in its division.

The Friendship class of the church school is in charge of the 6:30 dinner.

Realty Board Told Bill's Implications

Fletcher Says Provisions of Wheeler-Jones Bill not Understood

Belief that farmers are not fully apprised of the Wheeler-Jones farm credit bill's provisions was expressed yesterday by Fletcher of the Commercial Mortgage company in a talk analyzing the bill and its probable effects, Friday noon at the Salem Realty board luncheon.

The 3 per cent interest feature will attract farmers and force private lenders out of the farm loan field—but it marks the first direct invasion of the credit business by government, Fletcher said. In addition, he predicted that it would be extremely costly to the taxpayers.

If debt adjustment is sought by the farmer, he will have to deed his property outright to the government with option to repurchase at the end of five years. Fletcher pointed out the governor of the farm credit administration will have extensive arbitrary powers and since he will be an appointee of the secretary of agriculture, this also means enforced compliance with all of the department's programs.

Fletcher also objected to the elimination of the cooperative feature of present farm loan organizations, which gives the borrower a proprietary interest in the soundness of their operations.

The Realty board voted to assist in financing the Salem high school debate team's trip to Illinois for the national contests, after the matter was presented by Zeral Brown, member of the team.

In his lecture here a week ago, Page advanced the theory that Christians must of necessity be pacifists. Rev. Williams, respecting his theories, maintains that there is scriptural background to refute this charge. Following his address, the meeting will be given to open discussion.

Last Sunday night Rev. Williams gave this presentation to the college Christian Endeavor group, and it is being repeated before the entire general congregation in answer to many requests.
