SILVERTON—When the approval of the Silverton chamber of commerce has been obtained, the committee from the Silverton Parent Teacher association will ask Silverton business houses for donations to support the summer recreation program again this year. The PTA is sponsoring the program for the second year. Last summer several hundred children attended the sessions at a cost of approximately \$250. Teachers are largely furnished through the WPA supervised by an educational director to be selected by the committee and the school board.

Mrs. Irene Roubal has been named general management chairman for the summer program and will be assisted by O. E. Lee, chairman of the school board and H. W. The program is to include swimming, softball, tennis, badminton, classes in art, story hours and others.

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US Warns Japan as Holland Colonies Periled



This map shows the Dutch East Indies in relation to British, French, American and Japanese spheres of influence. America, through Secretary of State Hull and President Roosevelt, has proclaimed a "hands off" policy in that danger area, this applying to all nations. Japan has expressed "concern" over status quo of Netherlands Indies. Islands owned by Dutch are depicted in heavy outline. They include Sumatra, Java, Celebes, Borneo, lesser islands. Britain's Singapore naval base is at the Malay tip. Philippines lie midway on the direct sea route from Japan to the Indies, source of vital tin and rubber coveted by powers. French naval bases are at Saigon and Hanoi on Asiatic mainland. Japan now controls Hainan Island, seized from China, also has a submarine base on the Paracel Islands, midway between Manila and Saigon. America's Guam is not a naval base for submarines or aircraft. Population of Dutch East Indies is 61,000,000.—IIN service.

Hopewell School Elects Principal

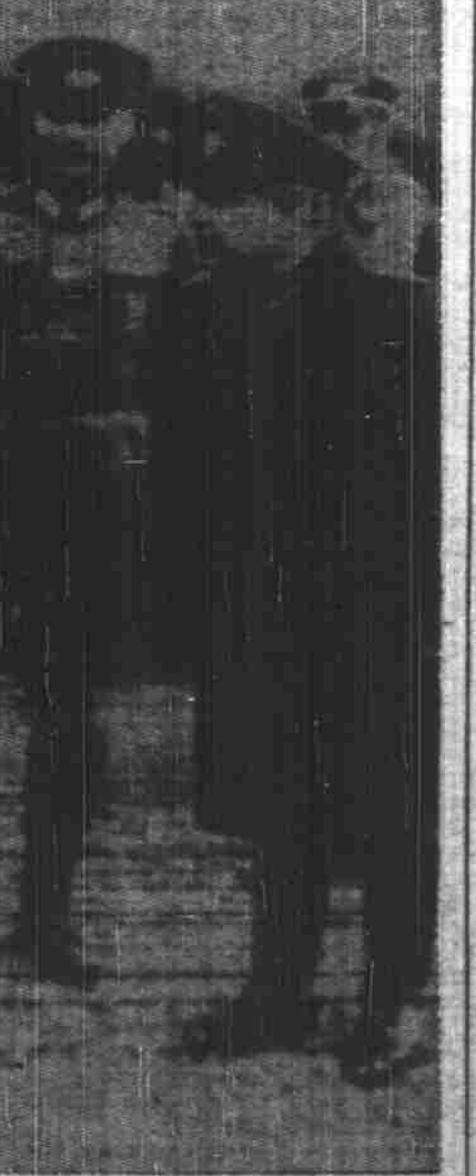
HOPEWELL—Mrs. Joe Beatty principal of the Hopewell school has been re-elected. She has taught here three years.
