Republicans Gain 6176, 30 Counties

Total Reported Is 12,100 Over Registration in 1938 Primary

Registration of voters in Oregon for the 1940 primary election has increased over 1938 by 6176 for the republicans and 6571 for the democrats, figures for 30 counties showed yesterday. The republican total is 121,634 and the democratic 131,660. The counties which have not yet reported their registration figures are Baker, Grant, Jackson, Josephine, Lane and Multnomah.

The total registration for the 30 counties is 286,909, compared with 274,809 two years ago. Figures for counties reporting today, and comparisons with the 1938 primary totals, follow: Marion - 21,699 republicans, up 1507; 15,014 democrats, up 1106; 37,153 total, up 2904. Umatilla - 6,680 republicans, down 327; 4690 democrats, down 379; 11,474 total, down 711. Gilliam - 769 republicans, down 20; 740 democrats, down 82; 1516 total, down 108. Malheur - 2,931 republicans, down 23; 3974 democrats, up 228; 6904 total, up 211.

For change of the former location of Yew Park school from class two residential to class three business, requested by Hans Hansen and Rich L. Reimann.
