Group Making Further Study

Silverton Council May Consider Findings This Week

SILVERTON—It is expected a special meeting of the city council will be called this week to consider for the second time the report of the committee appointed by Mayor Zetta Schlador last December to investigate the management of the city. The second committee report, it is understood, is now completed.

The first report was heard at a special meeting of the city council and five of the nine committee members a week ago. The figures submitted at this meeting were not accepted as "a true picture" by all committee members present. Discussion revolved around alleged incongruity of cooperative salary basis between cities. Some of the committee, as well as council members, felt that it was almost impossible to obtain a more complete picture without too exhaustive a study of all administrative problems peculiar to each city.

The regular meeting of the city council falls on May 6, but it is expected a special meeting will be called to hear the committee's report, which has awakened considerable interest in the city.

Educator Says Times Ripe for Dictatorship

MONMOUTH—Stating that he did not refer to President Roosevelt as a possible dictator, but that many indications are evident to thoughtful people on conditions being fertile for a dictatorship, Superintendent Paul J. Misner spoke Saturday at the educational conference here, raising the question: "Is democracy worth saving?"

"As we sit here this morning," the world is preparing itself to wage another world war to have democracy," he stated. "I do believe in democracy. I believe that belief in, and education for, democracy is the world's only hope. But until we learn to live together cooperatively as Baptists and Methodists—as republicans and democrats, in our own back yards, there is little hope for a world democracy. No school can achieve it all. It must be achieved in a community."

In the one-room rural school the home played a large part in educating children in restraint and responsibility. Children had to share their possessions and things they learned to make things. Thus the early American rural home was an agency for democracy. The progressive school can not replace the one-room rural school in doing a duty in education.

The school has control of only 14 per cent of a child's waking hours. The schools need to become aware to the real problems of the child's every-day life. In the face of world conditions, our only hope is to relate the schools to life because children are dealing too much with meaningless abstractions at school—receiving their real education from the radio, movies and in the streets.

Dr. W. A. Doppler of the National Tuberculosis association, Washington, D.C., addressing the afternoon assembly, stated that one out of every three deaths of young women from the age of 15 to 25 is caused by tuberculosis. He traced the history of the disease from its correct diagnosis long before the time of Christ to the present, showing how air, climate, sunshine, diet, exercise, rest and finally surgery were tried in the slow process of finding how to properly treat and cure the disease.

He stated that the cleaning up of cattle herds had proved an important factor in eradication of the disease.

He mentioned the close connection of teachers and the school with tuberculosis prevention. Fatigue and loss of appetite, checked upon early may prevent the infection of real disease. If taken early it is curable, more so than other chronic diseases. If the patient comes late for treatment, his chances are far less favorable.

A wide range of subjects were discussed in panel groups by noted educators of the northwest, and the attendance was very large with Campbell hall auditorium filled to capacity.
