NEW YORK, April 30 .- (AP)-Leading stocks tried to extend the recovery move in today's market but the majority failed to accomplish much.

Steels, motors, aircrafts and utilities, moderately in front during the greater part of the pro-ceedings, backed away in the final hour. Rails, coppers and mail orders were apathetic throughout. Recently buoyant specialties inclined to lag, although a handful of these, including shipping stocks, edged for-

ward at the last. Closing prices were well mixed and the Associated Press average of 60 issues was unchanged at 50.2. Dealings, sluggish from the start, expanded a trifle in the concluding lap and transfers totaled 592,280 shares against 566,950 the day before.
