

Many new Ideas On 1940 Range

General Electric Feature Is More Efficient Calrod Unit

"The present day housewife has little conception of the cooking and housekeeping problems faced by her grandmother," says Barbara Miller, famed economist in charge of The Oregon Statesman cooking school.

Miss Miller goes on to point out that in the days of old the housewife had none of the modern electrical conveniences taken for granted by the modern generation of culinary artists. Grandmother had to rely on her own ingenuity with the old wood range, take care of her ironing by the heated flat iron system, and many other housekeeping tricks that are quite unnecessary during the present days.

Outstanding among the newer electrical appliances that are to be featured at the Statesman cooking school in session today, will be the new General Electric range for 1940.

Commenting on the modern improvements of the new General Electric, Department Manager Ray Moon of the Imperial Furniture company, stressed particularly the years of research and the millions of dollars that the housewife has saved by the use of new methods of improving its products.

OCE President Howard Says Waters Great Help in Education, Deserves To Get Doctor of Good Will Degree

Baseball keynoted most of the regular luncheon program of the Salem Kiwanis club yesterday when the organization played host to 17 members of the Salem Senators ball squad in addition to George Waters and "Biddy" Bishop, patron and manager respectively, members of the Salem Ad club, and Dr. Charles A. Howard, president of the Oregon College of Education at Monmouth, who paid tribute to Waters in the main address of the meeting.

"When my college is able to give a degree, I should like to confer one on George Waters," President Howard declared. "It will be DGW—doctor of good will."

"The effect of George Waters' baseball enterprise will be felt throughout the community, in the schools and outside of them," he declared. "We formal educators perform our task as best we know how, but our task is greatly assisted by the work of such natural educators as George Waters himself."

Dr. Howard spoke more fully on the subject of "What's Happening in the Schoolhouse," in the course of which he declared that the aim of modern education is to seek out and concentrate on the part of education which remains after a former student has forgotten much of the factual material which he mastered in school.

"There are new principles in modern education," he said. "Attitudes and criticisms are now considered important rather than subject matter. Skills, we have found, remain where formal learning soon is forgotten. In addition, modern education seeks to stimulate a child's interests in an

active way, so that he may enjoy the work which he is doing."

In addition to Dr. Howard, Mr. Waters told the club that "The nice things that they say about me don't sound good." He expressed pleasure that the community was supporting his Senators ball club.

Robert Sprague, president of the Salem Ad club, also spoke briefly.

Portland Teacher Buys Dance School

Paul Armstrong to Direct Instruction; Summer Classes Slated

Announcement that Richard Billings, head of the Billings School of Dancing in Portland, has purchased the Barbara Barnes dance school here and will establish a branch school of dancing in Salem, was made here yesterday. Mr. Billings is known to Salem residents both through his recitals and through his work the past three years in staging the ballet and dance numbers for the coronation ceremony for the Portland Rose festival.

Paul Armstrong, assistant to Billings and also well known to the dance world, will have charge of the Salem branch school. For several years past Armstrong has been in charge of Billings' branch dancing schools in eastern Washington and Idaho.

Mr. Billings will personally supervise the work of his Salem school. Gerard Fowler, Hollywood and New York ballet master and head of the ballet department in Billings' Portland school, will supervise the ballet department here. An opportunity will be given Salem dancers to appear in Portland dance programs, and professional Portland pupils will also be introduced in Salem.

Mr. Billings will give a dance recital in Salem in the near future, the date to be announced later. He also states that summer classes will be given here in intensive foot training, so that pupils will be ready for the opening dancing classes this fall. are Bud Zielke, John Roth, Carl Pitts and Roy Gerig. In addition another member, Herman Grimmer, was one of the two boys selected for American farmer candidate from Oregon.

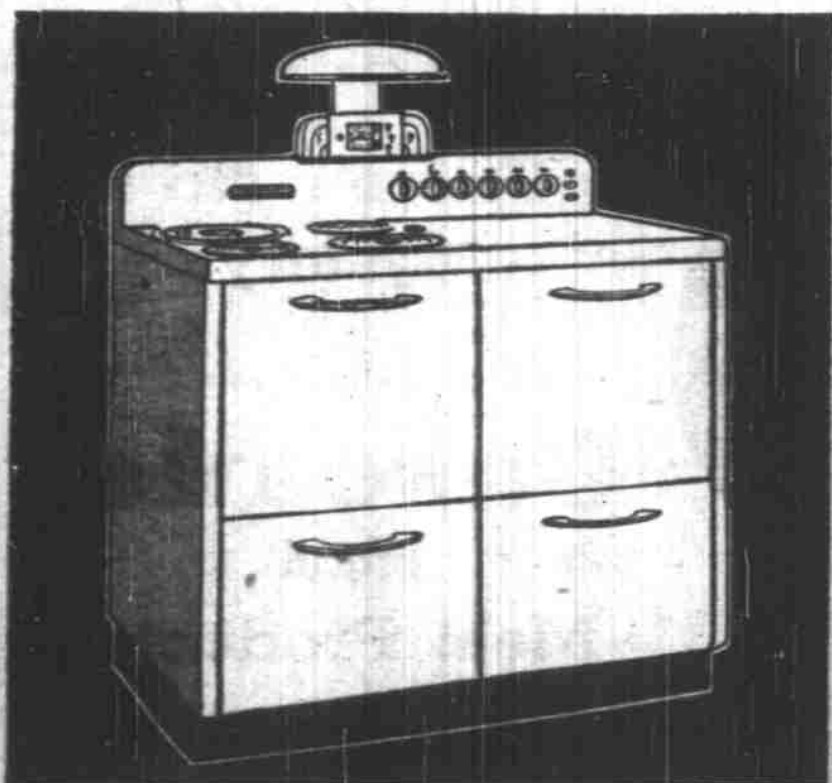
