

### Tribal State Said Goal of Dictators

McMINNVILLE, May 1.—(AP)—Governor Sprague told the Linfield college student body today that "because we think democracy is right is no sign it will succeed."

Democracy "is now being seriously charged," he said, and contrasted the ideals of democracy with totalitarianism. The problem is not what country may rise to power over another, but where this new conception of government is leading the world, he added.

"It seems it is leading us back to a tribal status where the normal business is war and peace is just an interlude between wars."

### Sulfanilamide Changing Treatment Of Severe Infections, Says Doctor

PORTLAND, Ore., May 1.—(AP)—The treatment of severe infections has been completely revolutionized by the discovery of the therapeutic value of sulfanilamide and its related compounds, Dr. Edwin Bannick of Seattle said here today.

The power drug still is in the experimental stage, he told the opening session of the University of Oregon Medical School Alumni association, and its future value is infinite, particularly in the treatment of septic sore throats and other infections.

He warned that the drug is dangerous and should only be used by physicians.

Dr. Thomas D. Robertson of Portland, president, said 250 physicians from all sections of the west registered for the three-day convention.

The Oregon state crime detection laboratory was discussed by Dr. Joseph Boeman of Portland, who explained the laboratory is open to defense and prosecuting attorneys.

### Raver Speaks on Power at College

PORTLAND, Ore., May 1.—(AP)—Private power companies were accused by Bonneville Dam Administrator Paul J. Raver today of fighting "to preserve their empires against competition" despite elections favoring public systems.

Raver told Reed college students he was not speaking for or against a people's utility district for Portland, an issue to be voted upon in less than three weeks.

The Bonneville administration's program, he said, is to produce and distribute wholesale power at lower rates than those charged by private distributors generating their own power. Because of the nation's experience with privately-owned utilities and holding companies, Raver added, the federal government was forced to sponsor publicly distributed power.

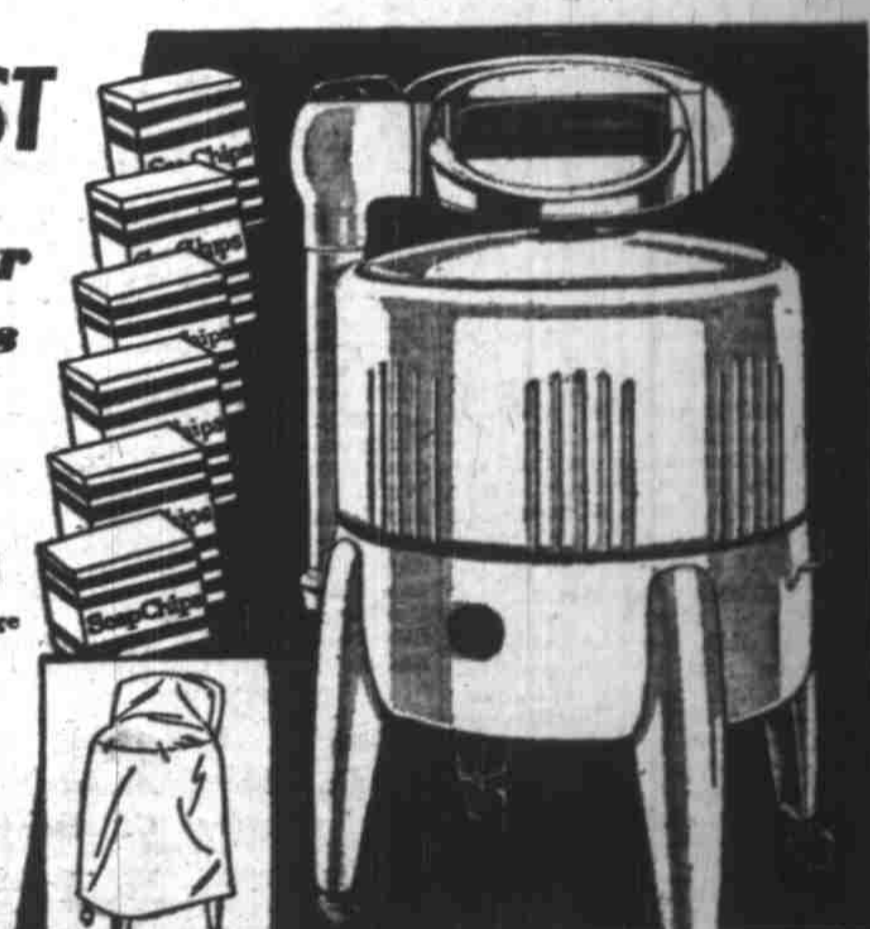

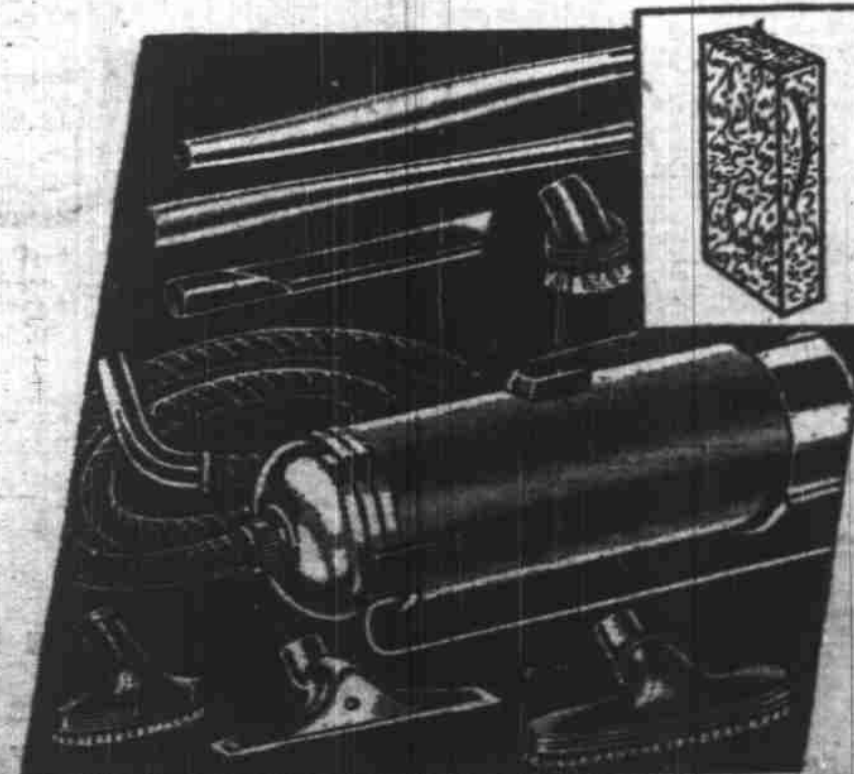
