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Lebanon's Population Increases 50 Per Cent

LEBANON—Census returns indicate that Lebanon's population is 2748, an increase of nearly 50 per cent over the 1930 figure which was 1851. The South Lebanon precinct, enumerated by Mrs. Elsie Ellenberg has 966 residents; North Lebanon, enumerated by Everett Macomber, has 940; and Lebanon central ward, counted by Oscar Ingraham, has 842.

These figures do not include the Strawberry precinct which lies just outside of the city limits but for the most part within the Lebanon school district and in which Lyon Lawless counted over 600. He is now taking the census in Sweet Home.

Two Lebanon high school teachers have accepted other positions. Lawrence Bennett, teacher of art and English, has been given the position of general assistant to H. W. Bullard, chief Pacific coast engineer of the Evans Products company. His place will be taken by Minna Ratney, a graduate of Linfield college.
