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Fire Destroys Ice Building

Loss Estimated at \$1000; Was Part of Dairy Plant at Independence

INDEPENDENCE—Fire destroyed the ice-making plant of the Independence Dairy Products plant Sunday night. The blaze was discovered at 7:45 p. m., and the Independence fire department responded to a call and put the flames out before it spread to the creamery building.

The ice-making plant was located in a wooden building at the rear of the creamery. The cause of the fire has not been determined but Joe Rogers, manager of the plant, reports that he had left the plant at 6:20 and everything was all right at that time. He estimates the damage to the equipment and building at approximately \$1000, which was partially covered by insurance.

Ray Walden, local auto mechanic, was a one-man fire department when he discovered a fire in the brooder house of his neighbor, pastor of the United Presbyterian church at 515 Monday morning. Walden aroused Dr. Butler and the flames were extinguished after a considerable damage to the brooder house and the loss of 200 six-week old chickens.

Matthew Craft Services Held

ALBANY—Funeral services for Matthew B. Craft, 80, who passed away at his country home four miles east of Albany Friday, were held from the Fisher funeral home Monday at 1:30. Rev. J. O. Born in Iowa May 9, 1860, he came to Oregon with his parents when he was 4 years of age. The family located in the Providence neighborhood. In May, 1880, he married Annie Garland at Scio. Mrs. Craft died on April 30, 1938.

Surviving are two daughters, Miss Pearl Craft and Mrs. Agnes Wright, both of Albany, and three brothers, Charles T. Craft and A. D. Craft, both of Scio, and J. A. Craft of Salem.

Lebanon Woman Heir to Estate

LEBANON—Mrs. Hester Alley has, by stipulation been decreed sole heir to approximately \$149,000, the residue of an estate in San Diego, Calif. John E. Bradley, called the "slot machine king" of San Diego, who was unmarried, left an estate of \$219,142. He made specific bequests amounting to \$50,000 but made no provision for the disposition of the residue. Last September, after months of search by lawyers, Mrs. Alley, the half-sister of Bradley's father, F. W. Bradley, was located and she had never seen the deceased, was declared his legal heir.

Mrs. Alley went to California two weeks ago to be present at the final disposition of the estate and to visit her son, R. B. Alley, at Vista, Calif. Her other children, Mrs. Alfred Rucker, Mrs. Ruth Burleson and J. B. Alley, live in Lebanon. Mrs. Alley was born near Lebanon in 1865.
