

Surfacing Work on Spring Hill Road Will Start This Week

Grading, Oil Project Ready

Curves to Be Eliminated, Road Widened in Several Places

ALBANY—Work of surfacing the Spring Hill road, which leads from Albany to Burns Vista and Independence, is to get under way this week, according to reports received here. The road lies in Benton county, but is the connecting link between Albany and the country to the west and north on the north side of the Willamette river.

Three factors are taking part in the work. The federal government is furnishing \$20,000 in road funds, the county has obtained the rights of way and is doing the grading and the state highway department will supervise oiling operations.

The county graders will get in operation immediately, and it is expected at least a month will be required to get the roadbed in shape for the oiling.

In a number of places the present road is to be widened, and several sharp curves are to be eliminated. It is not expected that oiling operations will start until late in June.
