Silverton Concerned With City Politics

SILVERTON — European war situations during the past week took second place to local politics in Silverton's street conversations, while state and national election talk was scarcely even heard.

For the first time in many years a real issue is at stake on Silverton's local ballots. A change in the city form of government has been proposed. Proposed by initiative petition, fostered by Silverton's planning council, is a measure which would adopt a manager form of government in place of the present mayor-city council form.

The new form, explain those who favor it, provides for seven council men from whom is chosen a mayor. The council then selects a manager for the city. The new measure provides that the manager shall be an outside man, unrelated to city officials, and trained in city management. This, the proponents state, would make for more efficient and a more economical government, and the manager's salary could be saved from elimination of present duplications. As city councilmen, to fill the three vacancies which occur by terms expiring this year, the Planning Council favors R. G. Allen, J. W. Jordan and E. L. Starr, all Republicans. They propose Lowell Brown as mayor. However, should the new form of government go in, a mayor will not be needed, and it is understood that Brown would run for the fourth councilman on the autumn ticket.

The opponents to the new form of government claim that Silverton is too small a place for a city manager and that at present Silverton cannot afford a city manager. The city is just now, opponents report, getting itself into financial shape, where it can see its way clear, and a city manager would be an added expense right now. This group names as its choice for councilmen, A. W. Green, Democrat, and L. M. Larson, Republican. It has not named a third man to complete the fulfillment of the three vacancies, and has not named a choice for mayor.

M. C. Storvick, incumbent, is running unopposed for city treasurer, and evidently Silverton will have no recorder, as George W. Hubbs, incumbent, refused to be a candidate for reelection and no one else filed.
