Ruler Choice Will Be Made

Nine Princesses to Vie for Queen of Annual Berry Festival

LEBANON — The Strawberry Fair festivities begin Friday night with the queen's ball which will be held in the Legion hall. Dancing which will begin at 8:30 will continue until 10 o'clock when the grand march of the nine princesses, representing all of the high schools of the county, will pass the judges' stand. Each princess will be introduced by Del Davenport, master of ceremonies. When the judges have announced their choice of queen for the 1940 Strawberry Fair, dancing will be continued.

Spec Keene of Willamette university has been secured as one of the judges and he will ask two others who are strangers in Linn county to serve with him. Mrs. Hiram Groves, Mrs. Harry Miller, Mrs. Edward Bohle and Mrs. Herbert Ramsay have planned and made the gowns. 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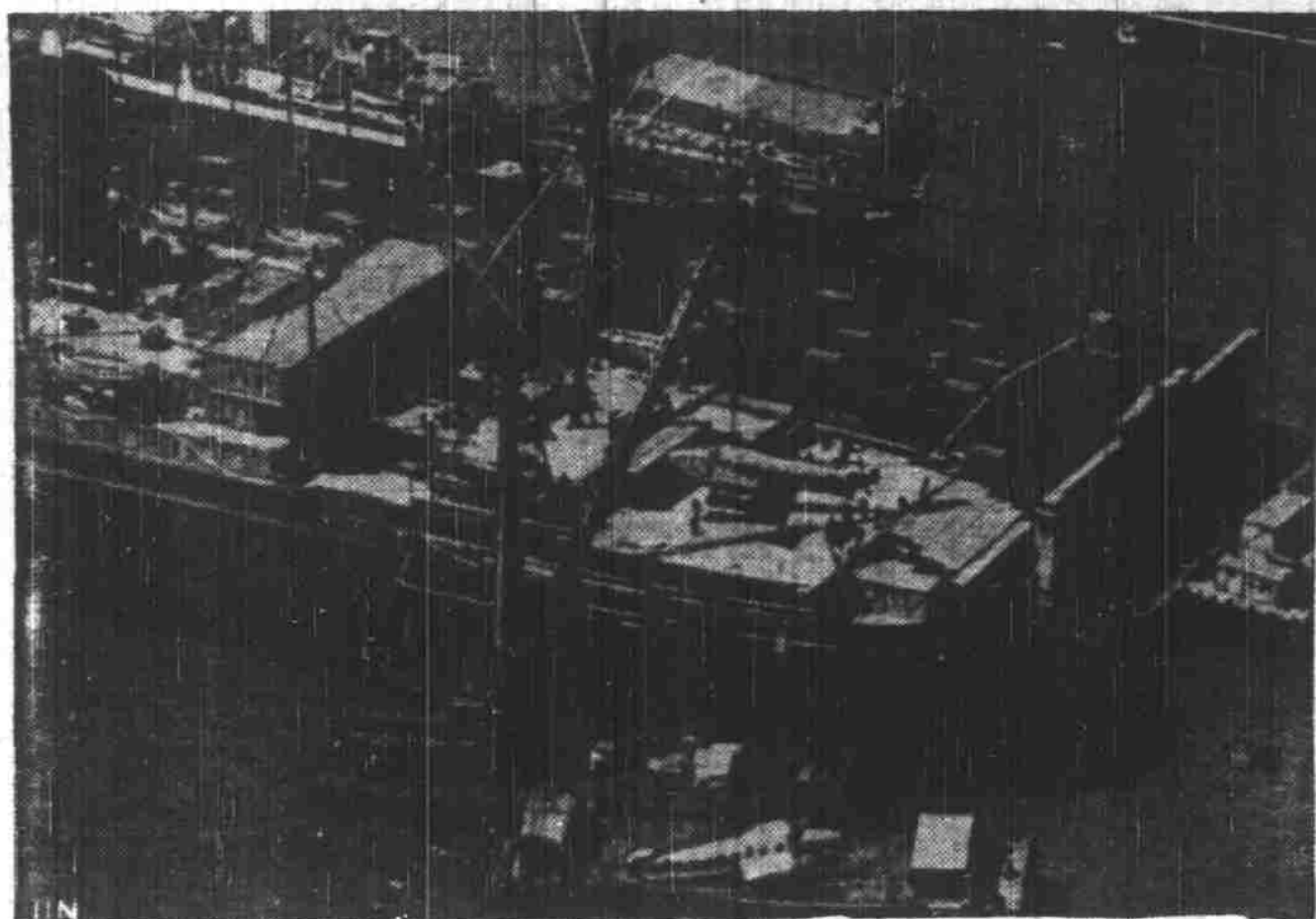
