Lebanon Woman's Civic Club Will Direct Annual Show

LEBANON — As in previous years the Woman's Civic club will have charge of the flower show held during the Strawberry Fair. Mrs. Elsie Eilenberg, Mrs. Rol Oldham and Mrs. C. C. Whitehead, the committee in charge, ask that all entries be brought to the IOOF hall in containers, by 11 a. m. the first day of the fair, Friday, and left until 9 p. m. Saturday.

Prizes will be awarded in the following classes: Roses, 3 prizes for the best single specimens of each of the colors, red, yellow, white, pink, and var. colored and for the best bouquets of several varieties: class II, mixed flowers, three prizes for the best large bouquets and the best small bouquets; class III, three prizes for the best bouquets in baskets, vases or bowls with greenery, one kind to a bouquet of each of the following: Sweet peas, columbine, delphinium, iris, snapdragon, peonies and poppies; class IV, miniature arrangements, two prizes, container and flower together, not to exceed four inches in height; class V, new or unusual named flowers or shrubs, two prizes; class VI, wild flowers, two prizes.

Judges for the flower show have not yet been secured.

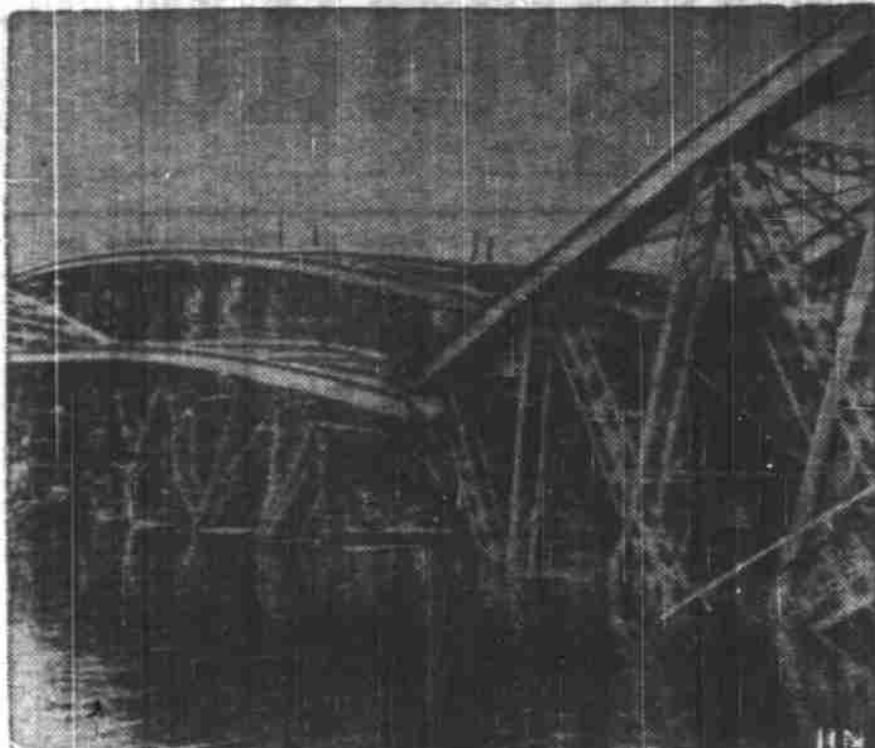
Dallas Chamber To Aid Program

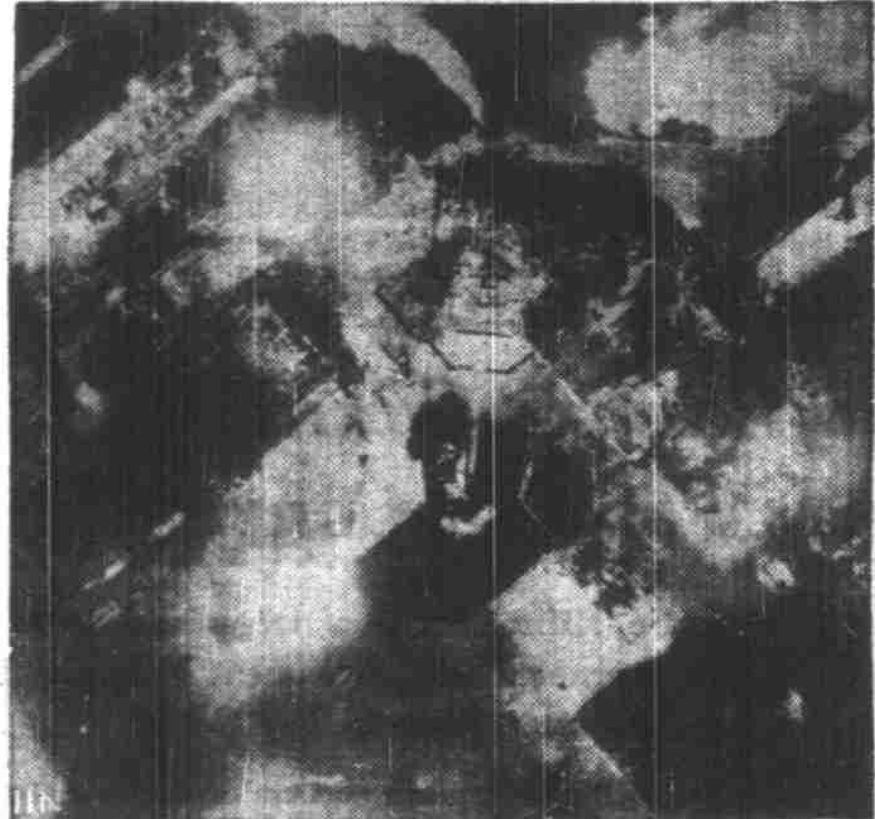

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Wright Mayor At Jefferson

City Charter Amendment Carries by one Vote Only

JEFFERSON — At the city election Friday held in the city hall, Irvine Wright was elected mayor of the city to succeed T. O. Kester, present mayor. J. H. Roland was reelected city recorder, and Martha Hutchings, treasurer, E. S. Gleason and D. Murphy were reelected as councilmen, and W. D. Barnes was elected as a new member of the council.

The proposed amendment to the city charter carried by one vote only. The amendment will "grant the city council power to incur indebtedness and borrow money upon the faith of the city, up to but not exceeding \$1500, separate and apart from, in addition to the \$2500 general debt limitation imposed by the charter, and solely for the purpose of improving, extending and adding to the sources and facilities of the city water system, and of improving the city cemetery, and to expend such moneys not exceeding such sum of \$1500 for such purposes, and to allocate not more than \$500 thereof to such water system purpose and not more than \$1000 thereof to cemetery purposes."
