Mt. Angel Post, Auxiliary to Sell 700; Memorial Day Mass Set

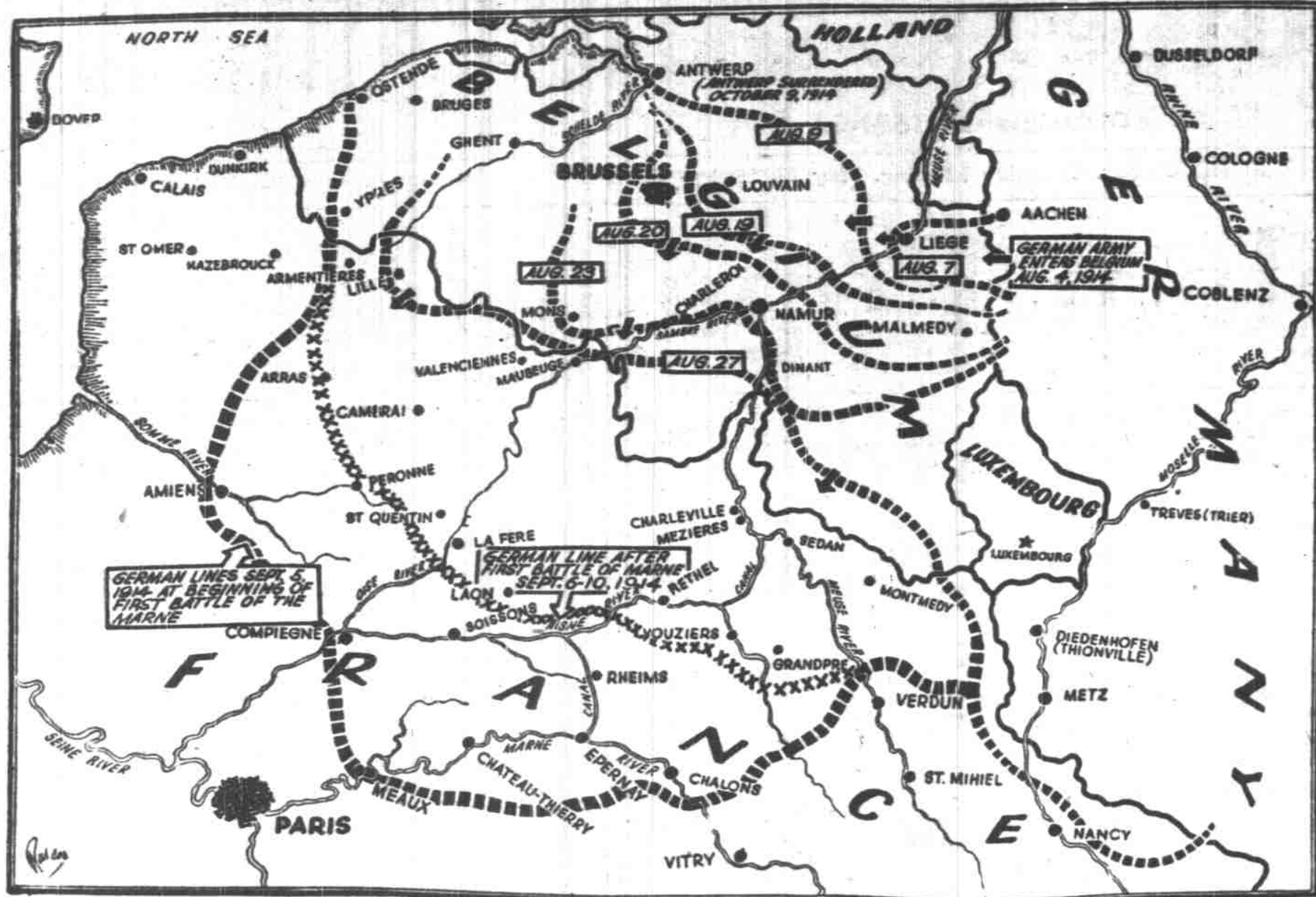
Resigns After 40 Years

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Silvertown School Debt at \$160,841

Budget Shows Estimated Expenses for Year at \$86,997.58

SILVERTON — Silvertown's school budget prepared for consideration of the district shows that the total indebtedness of the district is now \$160,841, and that of this the warrant indebtedness on warrants issued and endorsed "not paid for want of funds," stands at \$76,841. The bonded indebtedness of the school at this time is \$84,000.

The total estimated expenses for the next year are \$86,997.58 with total receipts at \$43,000. The balance of \$43,997.48 will be raised by district tax. Interest on bonds and warrants stands equally at \$2450 each. The total teaching expense, which includes supplies, textbooks, supervision, superintendent and the teachers' salaries counts to \$49,420. Of this the superintendent receives \$3,000, the supervisors, \$5165, and the teachers, \$46,070. Health service is placed at \$1279, and the library expense for the three schools at \$2510. Operation of the plant, which includes fuel, light and water shows at \$8975.
