First Building Planned, Road

Front Street Construction Will Start Near Steel Bridge, With Ramps

First construction on Portland's \$4,000,000 Front street highway project will involve the 5600-foot section from Columbia street to Steel bridge, the state highway commission decided at a special meeting here yesterday. This construction would in-

clude ramps to the Morrison and Hawthorne bridges which will take off from the highway and to the Steel bridge, which will carry traffic to the east side. Chairman Henry Cabell said

that actual construction would not start on any part of the project until the highway commission has completed negotiations for rights-of-way on the Columbia street-Steel bridge section and has received from the Union Pacific railroad company a longterm lease for permission to use the Steel bridge,

The new highway will be sixlane and will replace the present Pacific highway through Portland.

The commission announced that negotiations for the rightsof-way and permission to use the Steel bridge would get under way within a few days with Cabell in charge.
