Dorothy Dvorak to Start Reign Thursday at Lebanon

LEBANON—Dorothy Dvorak will be crowned queen of the Strawberry fair here Thursday, May 30, at 5 o'clock in the high school auditorium. Miss Dvorak, senior at Albany high school, was selected from among the nine princesses chosen by the high schools of the county.

The high school band will open the program and there will be other musical numbers by the boys' glee club, the girls' trio and a piano duet by Marilyn Scroggins and Dorothy Bohle. Walter Scott, president of the chamber of commerce, will make the address of welcome and Mayor T. W. Munyan will follow him. Then the princesses will be announced and will be escorted to the platform by their escorts. They will be followed by the queen elect.

The prime minister will be William Shepherd, the secretary of state, Irvin P. Bryan, lord chamberlain, Robert Johnson, messengers, William Warden. The princesses' escorts will be: Del Davenport, Richard Reeves, George Britton, R. M. Floyd, Douglas Wall, Dr. George Crain, Jack Stolsig and Harry Miller. The queen's escort will be Kenneth Mayer.

Berries to Be Entered
LEBANON—Marshall and Red Hearts are the only kind of strawberries for which prizes are offered during the Strawberry fair because they are the varieties which have proved themselves suited to growing conditions here and commercially.

The prizes as announced by Frank Groves who is in charge of exhibits, total \$100 and are to be awarded as follows: Eight prizes for each of the two varieties, the Marshall and the Red Heart; first prize \$3; second, \$2; third, \$1; fourth, \$1; fifth, \$1; sixth, \$1; seventh, \$1; eighth, \$1. For exhibits of large berries prizes of \$3, \$2 and \$1 are offered.

All exhibits must be in place in the Odd Fellows hall before noon Friday, May 25, and the fair. Crates and hallecks may be had free at the feed stores. When the berries are to be shown in crates, the hallecks will be turned upside down so only one layer of berries is needed.

The county agent's office cooperated in securing Professor Brown of the horticultural department of the state college, to serve as judge. In the decisions regarding the berries, 20 points will be allowed for each Uniformity of size, uniformity of coloring, firmness, keeping qualities, maturity and arrangement.

Indications are that there will be as many as a hundred crates on exhibition.

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Lebanon Lacks Night Officer

Attorney General's Ruling Affects Position; Matter Contested

LEBANON—At the last meeting of the city council the position of night officer was declared vacant because of a decision handed down by Attorney General I. H. VanWinkle that a city officer automatically resigns his position if he accepts the contest of a decision. The decision of the council is being contested. Upon advice of his attorneys, C. G. Hardy is reporting for duty although Jess Moss, who waits his position of night officer, is also acting. The latter is not a resident of Lebanon but says he will move into the city if he is retained.

SILVERTON—Because of Mrs. W. S. Jack's poor health, Mr. and Mrs. Jack will observe their golden wedding anniversary quietly at their home Tuesday. Mrs. Jack has been in ill health for the past few years.

Mr. and Mrs. Jack are among Silverton's most widely-known citizens. Both have been prominent in the development of the city and community and Mr. Jack has been a member of the city council and has served as mayor. Both have been active in a number of fraternal orders. And both are members of Willamette valley pioneer families. Mr. Jack was born at Bute Creek on May 13, 1855, the son of William and Mary (Weddle) Jack. Mrs. Jack was born in Silverton, a daughter of John and Senah (Jones) Morley.

Laura Alice Morley and William Sherman Jack were married at the United Brethren parsonage by Rev. Mr. Barley at Pine Tree four corners on May 28, 1890. At first they farmed in the Marquam district. Mr. Jack often tells of their work clearing land, working into the night.

Around 1900, the Jacks moved to Silverton, where Mr. Jack engaged in the undertaking business, first going to Portland to study the trade with Finlay & Sons and later studying under Professor Meyer of Toledo, Ohio. He continued in that work owning his own establishment until 1921 when he sold half interest to E. R. Ekman. About 14 years ago he sold the other half interest to Ekman and retired from the firm completely.

Since that time he has devoted his time to his home place and to various hobbies. The gardens of Mr. and Mrs. Jack have long been admired. They built their present home in 1905.

For years, the Jacks spent part of each summer at Cascade where Mr. Jack was known as the Mayor of Cascadia. Until Mrs. Jack became ill three years ago, Mr. Jack was known for his fishing ability as he had been heard to tell that he traded his first dozen eggs as a child for two fish hooks.

Woodburn Summer Water Rates in

WOODBURN—The city council took action to put summer rates in effect for woodburn water users Tuesday night.

The new rates will be in effect in June, bills to be payable July 1. May bills payable June 1 will be under the old winter rates.

Summer rates will remain in effect four months. Both summer and winter rates provide for \$1 minimum monthly bill, which in each case pays for 4000 gallons of water. In summer all over 4000 gallons is billed at the rate of 10 cents per thousand gallons. In winter the rate is 20 cents per thousand for the second 4000, and all above that is 15 cents per thousand.

Polk CMTC Quota Is Set at Nine

DALLAS—Mildred Staffin, county chairman of the Citizens' Military Training Camps association of Polk county, states that the 1940 quota for applicants in Polk county is nine. Any boy wishing to take advantage of the offer is asked to contact her soon.

The CMTC will be held at Vancouver Barracks, Wash., during the period of July 2 to July 31 with approximately 503 persons being present to take part in the camp activities.

Boys entering the camp must be between the ages of 17 and 23 years, of average general intelligence, able to read and write and be of good moral character.

Training consists mostly of calisthenics, close order drill, interior guard duty, lectures, hygiene and first aid, parade and target practice. Each year a rifle team is selected to go to Camp Perry, Ohio, with the necessary expenses paid, to compete in the national matches. Afternoons from 2 to 5 are devoted to athletics and recreation consisting of baseball, softball, volleyball, tennis, golf, swimming and boxing.
