

Stock Market Turns Upward

Domestic Business Hopes Offset War Worries; Seat Sold Cheap

NEW YORK, May 27.—(AP)—Leading stocks turned upward in today's market as hopes for domestic business tended to offset war worries.

Gains for favorites ran to more than 2 points in the forenoon but a little selling in the final hour reduced these in most cases. Dealings also were the lightest in about two weeks, which tempered optimism a trifle. Steels, aircrafts and coppers were most popular.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks held a net advance of .7 of a point at 38.8. This was 1.1 points above the year's bottom. The day's gain in the composite was since April 2. At the same time, transfers of 791,260 shares were the smallest since May 8. They compared with 871,360 last Friday.

Sale of a stock exchange seat for \$43,000, off \$7,000 from the last transaction to a new bottom since 1915, served to cool sentiment.

On the upside at the finish, although some were under the day's tops, were US Steel, Bethlehem, Douglas Aircraft, United Aircraft, Sperry, Sears Roebuck, General Motors, Anaconda, Kennecott, American Smelting, American Telephone, Du Pont, Westinghouse, Allied Chemical, Johns-Manville, US Gypsum, Santa Fe and Chesapeake & Ohio.

Chicago's Wheat Market Depressed

CHICAGO, May 27.—(AP)—Wheat prices backed down today in a market depressed by disappointing war news, lagging European demand for grain and diminished activity following the placing of large cash wheat and flour orders last week.

Chicago wheat fell as much as 1 1/2 cents at times while Winnipeg losses amounted to almost 2 cents. Weakness of the Canadian market, which advanced 4 cents Saturday, caused some disappointment here.

What here closed 1/2-1 1/2 cents lower than Saturday, July 84-84 1/2, September 83 1/2-84.

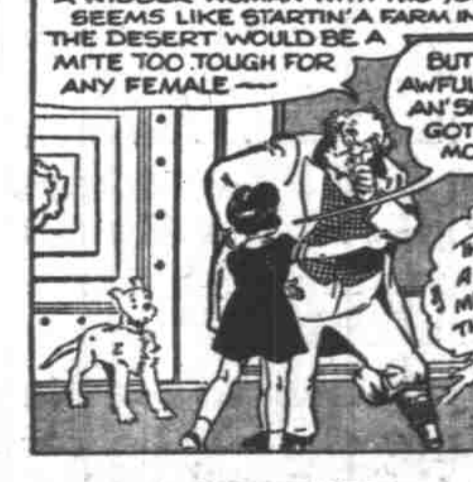

Berry Pool Sold

Price Unrevealed, but Under Last Year's; School Meet Held

SILVERTON HILLS—Three business meetings were combined in one at the community hall here Saturday night when a larger group gathered to settle the site for the new school for the recently combined schools districts, elect officers for the community club and dispose of the strawberry pool.

At the latter meeting the strawberry pool, representing one of the largest in the state, was sold to the Kelley-Farquhar firm at Salem. The growers did not reveal the price but admitted that due to unsettled conditions in Europe it was somewhat less than a year ago. The picking price in general prevailed at 1 1/2 cents a pound. But pickers were paying from 1/2 to 1/4 cent bonus for an entire season's picking. The question of pickers was serious, growers reported with a decided shortage.

At the school meeting, a mass meeting of the former Hull, Porter, Davis and Mt. View districts, the group voted not to build this summer. School will be held at Porter, with Davis pupils attending here also, and at Mt. View with Hull pupils being transported there. The site selected was on the Caly Porter ranch immediately across from the L. O. Hadley home. Approximately four acres were available here and the price agreed upon was \$50. Mrs. Irma Wattersson, who taught at Hull last year will teach at Porter and Mary Agnes Casey who taught at Mt. View will teach there again.

Officers elected at the community club meeting were president, Maurice Benson; vice president, Eidon Mulkey; secretary-treasurer, Mrs. Victor Howard; board members, Vergil Tschants, Frank Porter, Leslie Beugli, Eidon Mulkey and Victor Howard.
