

Linn County's Fifth Lamb Show Draws Largest Attendance; Exhibits Fewer

Partial Prize List Announced

Condition of Animals Is Unusually Good, Sheepmen Say

SCIO—With increased allotment of funds from the Linn county fair board and contributions solicited from Scio merchants, the Linn county fair lamb show May 25 at Scio rounded out its fifth year in a blaze of glory. Although the number of lambs exhibited this year was reported slightly below that of 1939, condition and quality of the animals made up for decrease in numbers, sheepmen in attendance declared. The show this year also drew a larger attendance than any of the five previously staged, it was announced.
