Bedient Case Is Ruled Upon

\$319.50 Lien Held to Exist Against Property; old Action Being Retried

Circuit Judge L. G. Lowellling yesterday decreed in the case of G. W. Bedient and Albert Hunt vs. Charles A. Anderson and W. F. Barnes that no lien existed with respect to Mrs. Anderson and that a \$319.50 lien did exist against realty held by her husband. The court allowed costs to neither side.

The Bedient case involved foreclosure on a residence lien in the Depot addition in which \$428.30 and \$100 attorney fee was originally asked for work done in repairing a house damaged by fire.

While Judge Lowellling was occupied with this hearing, a jury was drawn and opening testimony presented before Circuit Judge L. H. McMahan in the retrial of the \$5000 damage action of J. F. Ulrich vs. Henry A. Hochspeier. The case will continue today.

At a previous trial verdict was returned for the defendant, and retrial granted only when it was stated that Rufus B. Miller, alleged to be a personal enemy of the plaintiff, had mingled with members of the jury during the trial.

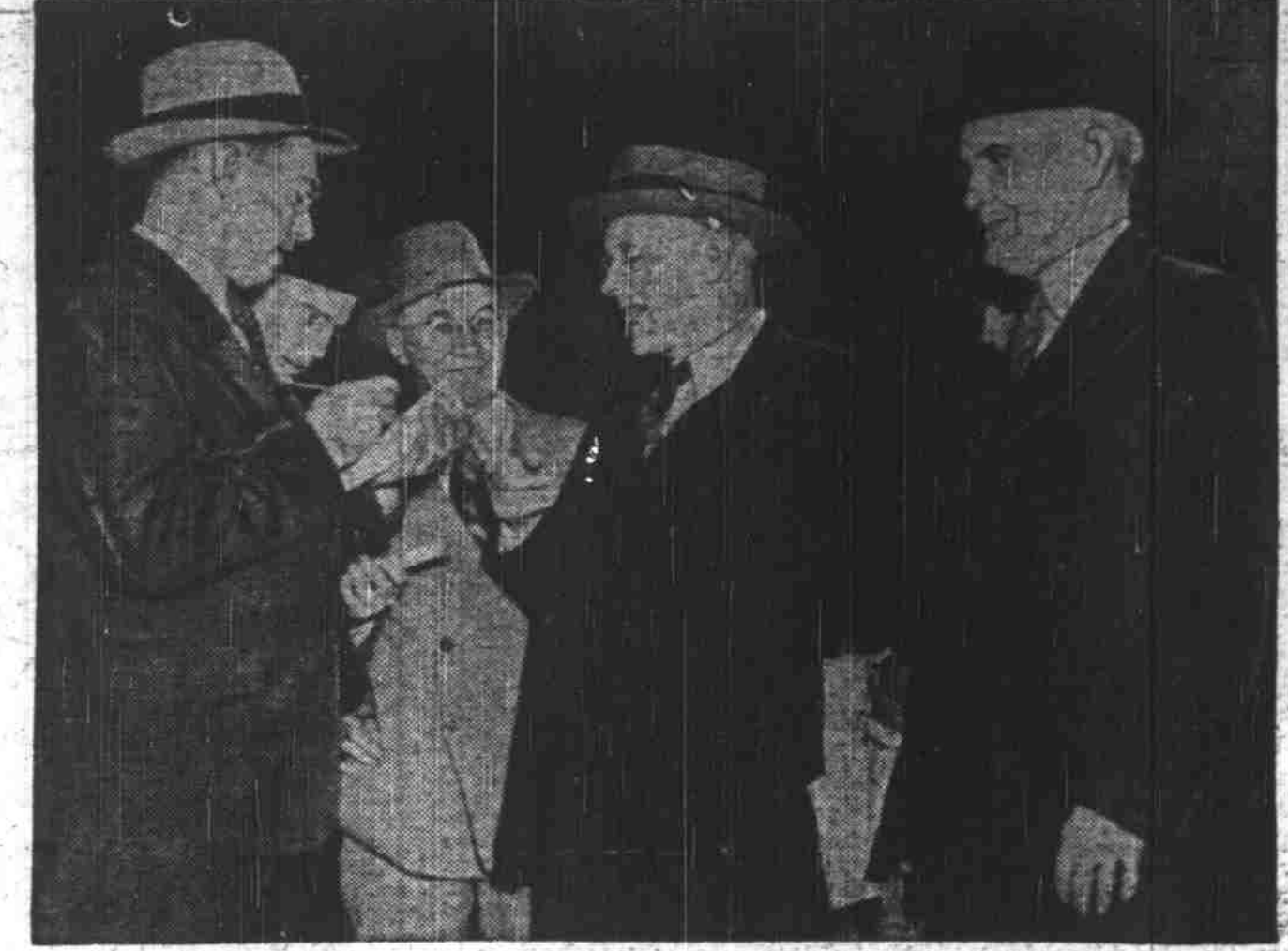

Claims Error in Picture Caption

The scene at a San Francisco bus terminal depicted in Sunday's Statesman under the caption "depots picketed as 700 bus drivers walk out," is that of a normal bus-departure time without relation to any strike situation.

It is contended by Roy E. Hurd, northwest division representative of the Street, Electric Railway and Motor Coach Employees of America (APL).

Mr. Hurd explained that the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen which is conducting a strike against the Pacific Greyhound lines was not an AFL union and declared that neither was it in good standing with other railway unions.

William Green of the AFL had issued orders to the state federations of labor and to the San Francisco labor council to support the Street, Electric Railway and Motor Coach Employees union in the jurisdictional dispute.

Out of 733 drivers employed by Greyhound, only 197 went out on strike instead of the 700 mentioned in the picture caption, Mr. Hurd asserted.

Forestry Probe Reopening Today

The Marion county grand jury will reconvene at the courthouse at 10 a. m. today to undertake investigation into routine criminal matters, and to continue study of affairs of the state forestry department during the administration of J. W. Ferguson.

District Attorney Lyle J. Page indicated yesterday that the jury has a considerable bulk of criminal matters to deal with, as well as an audit of the forestry department submitted to it several weeks ago by state authorities.

Ray Bassett Heads First Division Society; Preparedness Advocated

Ray H. Bassett was elected president to succeed Jesse S. Deakin at the banquet of the First Division society, AEF, Veterans of the World War of Salem, Saturday night. Two resolutions were adopted unanimously by the group of veterans, urging both state and national governments to adopt a preparedness program which would also aid in the relief of unemployment and a compulsory registration and constant check on aliens in the United States.

Other officers chosen were Lloyd A. Lee, secretary-treasurer, and Myron M. Moore, sergeant-at-arms.

Speakers were O. B. Gates of Hillsboro, whose two sons were killed in the World war, and Charles V. Leach of Olympia, Wash., one of whose sons lost his life in the war and the other is still living. Mr. Leach is a member of the American Legion post in Olympia named for his son.

Mr. Gates, Mr. Leach and Stephen Stone were invited to become honor members of the society. Mr. Leach will be honorary chaplain.

The place card, poppy, inscribed napkin and glass at the vacant place of General Charles P. Sumner, World war commander of the First, will be sent to him. A letter will be written to Christ Free, a member now in the hospital.

The program and banquet were arranged by Herbert E. Wood, retiring secretary.

Pageant Heads Are Appointed

Lauraine to Direct Dances for Centennial; Koski Named Choral Leader

Salem Centennial committees yesterday announced two more appointments to the staff which will produce the pageant to be staged in conjunction with the city's 100th anniversary celebration July 31, August 1, 2 and 3.

Alfred Lauraine, dance master for the Barbara Barnes school of dancing, has been retained as director of the pageant dances, in which 500 performers will be used.

Erjo Koski, choir master at the American Lutheran church, will be pageant choral director.

Both appointees were approved by Doris Smith, pageant director, and the music and pageant committees headed by H. V. Collins and Professor Herbert E. Rahe, respectively, according to Irl S. McSherry, general manager.

Koski came to Salem last fall and since has established music studios here and in Portland. He is a graduate of St. Olaf college in Minnesota and directed several large church choirs in that state before coming to Oregon.

Report Says no Reduction Seen

Indicates Small Profit Is Possible in Operation of Clatskanie PUD

The Clatskanie people's utility district could be operated at a small profit but no immediate rate reduction would be possible, the state hydroelectric commission reported here Monday.

The profit would be contingent upon the district using Bonneville power, the report said.

The report indicated that rate reductions would normally be made only when justified by the financial condition of the district and after the accumulation of reserve funds to care for possible emergencies.

"There is a possibility," the report continued, "that the district would be able to furnish to its people more electricity for the same revenue resulting in less cost per kilowatt hour to the consumer."

Distribution expenses were estimated at \$14 per customer per year.

Estimated surplus during the first four years was put at \$6459 and from the fifth year to the 20th year, inclusive, \$1557.

The district would comprise 67 square miles with a population of 3480 and assessed valuation of \$1,950,370.

The proposal to create the district, if referred to the voters, probably will be on the ballot at the next general election in November.
